## AAUW Tech Trekkers Thrilled By Their Experiences at Grace Hopper STEM Camp

If you had newspaper, masking tape, and one brief lecture on structural engineering, what would YOU build? Our six Tech Trek girls worked with their dorm teams to design and make a rocket, a windmill and the Golden Gate Bridge! Can you find the structural elements that make these structures strong?

Emilia Gutman, Henel Kaidantzis, Abbie Lee,

**Shannon Lipp, Hannah Liu** and **Reese Whipple** returned from their week-long Tech Trek camp on the Stanford University campus with glowing reports of fun and learning. Here's what they had to say:

Reese: "This has truly been one of the most amazing experiences in my lifetime... This camp has helped me gain confidence of who I am as a person and that doesn't come around every day." **Abbie:** "For me, the professional women's night was my favorite part. I loved hearing about all their careers and the different paths they took to get to where they are now." Shannon: "Tech Trek opened up so many doors for me. For example, I never knew I liked astronomy, but because of Tech Trek, I learned that I love astronomy and would like to study it in high school and/ or college." Emilia: "The mouse trap cars were so great [engineering core class]. I got mine to go the farthest. ... We also learned many physics laws and different calculations for engineering." Hannah: "I was in the 3D math group....We solved many math puzzles and some were pretty challenging. There was one I loved so much and was difficult... I didn't want to give it up so I used my flashlight [after lights out]. It was around 11:00 pm, I guess, when I finally got the answer! I was very excited and couldn't go to sleep for a long time!" Helen: "My favorite part of the week was visiting the VMWare company to see how real life programmers work. This experience really was life changing and I wish I could do it again. I grew in so many ways."

This year, core classes at camp included *Computer Coding and Cyber Sleuthing*, as well as *Marine Biology, CSI forensics, 3D Math*, and *Engineering Design*. At camp, the girls took apart computers, wrote computer code, dissected fish, solved problems using DNA code, measured vitamin C in chemistry lab, built functional robots that did tricks, and attended field trips to a marsh, Symantec, VMWare, the Stanford blood lab, virtual reality lab, and solar car. They also met numerous professional women scientists and engineers, just to mention a few of the activities.

**Gail Chesler, Christine Walwyn and Jan Cushman** had a wonderful time as dorm moms, keeping track of their groups 24/7 and attending classes and field trips – and even managing to get a few hours of sleep. And **Sara Lautenbach** joined us one morning for a tour of the core classes. This was an incredibly busy week!

Thank you to everyone who has donated their money and their time to supporting our scholarships for these outstanding girls!! With your support, maybe we can send seven girls next year!

Early this summer, Heidi and Stacia met with Roy Wensley, Dean of Saint Mary's College of Science. He thanked us for our great program last year and warmly welcomed our AAUW-OML branch program back to campus. SMC looks forward to our second Expanding Your Horizons STEM Conference for middle school girls. Our committee is meeting bi-weekly and appreciates being a new voting member on the board. We look forward to improved communications and additional input from our members at large.

In 2017, our focus is on inviting 150 girls, one-third from underserved communities. This requires adding workshops and reaching out to schools in Oakland and Richmond. All committee members have been asked to fundraise and we welcome ideas from the membership. We are hoping to work Sisterto-Sister concepts into our program. We would like to train young women to help with the conference, thus expanding our influence to include high school girls.

Outgoing President, Gail Chesler, requested informal reports of recent activities.

- The May Luncheon at Moraga Country Club was very well done and below budget.
- TechTrek enjoyed its ice cream social with the girls going to camp July with 6 girls and families.
- Scholarship raffle is really in need of funds in order to continue the Scholarship Funding. The committee is hoping for a good summer flow of raffle ticket donations.
- It was moved and passed to discontinue the Sister-to-Sister program. The board will discuss remaining disbursement of funds.
- A motion was made and Denise Burian was accepted as "President-Elect".
- Discussion on handling of Historian Books. There are 33 fabulous scrapbooks at the home of K DeGroot. Gail Chesler and Laura Wittenberg plan to scan them to permanent electronic devices. Each year's book will be given to the president who presided during that calendar year.
- We will celebrate 60 years of AAUW-OML at the September meeting.

Gail passed the Presidential gavel to Incoming President, Laura Wittenberg.

- Membership:Alison MacKenzie will set up a booth and attend Orinda 4<sup>th</sup> of July in the Community Park. Membership Cards could be made to accompany rosters.

- Hospitality: Gail will speak to the four women involved.

- •Restaurant Walk in Walnut Creek will take place October 11. Shred-Fest earned \$2000 for TechTrek.
- STEM Stacia Craigholm reported St Mary's College was interested in next year's program and a set a tentative date of March 18. The committee will consider reaching out to other AAUW branches for participation.
- Scholarship: Mary Ann McLeod reported \$650 in raffle money. Last year twice this amount had been sold so Mary Ann is encouraging all to sell tickets. The committee continue Kaplan testing and a Valentine party of some kind. With three new School "College and Career" counselors we will need extra work with the high school liaisons. The Gail Uilkema fund will permit two scholarship of \$5000 during 2016-17year and one more \$5000 for 2017-18. Looking at AAUW national emphasis of leadership, possibly the committee will consider leadership with community service as the basic requirement for AAUW-OML Scholarship.
- Start Smart.: No report but Sara Lautenbach had 40 girls at Chico and Marie Bonilla had 25 at DVC in the spring.

### **PUBLIC POLICY**

July 19 marked the 168<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the **Seneca Falls Convention**, the first political convention in American



history dedicated to the rights of women. More than 300 women and men joined together to protest the political, economic and social discrimination faced by women at the time. Several resolutions for women's equality, including a resolution in support of women's suffrage, were passed.

Though this monumental event served as the seedbed for organized women's suffrage in America, there is more work to be done. Think of that....after 168 vears there is still work to be done. Prohibitive voter ID laws as well as many other restrictive actions denying access to the ballot box still exist in many states across the country and continue to keep eligible voters from exercising their civil rights. Voter disenfranchisement predominantly affects women, students and minority populations. With a November election on the horizon, it is imperative that a clear path to the voter box be made available.

Watch for ways that you can add your voice to policy decisions through the *two-minute activist* and by working to get-out-the-vote in November.

## AAUW's \$TART \$MART Salary Negotiations Workshop at Chico State

AAUW offers workshops on negotiating fair salaries as part of our overall work to "Close the Pay Gap." On March 30th, our new OML and DAW branches member, **Sara Lautenbach** facilitated a workshop at Chico State with a room of nearly 50 students.

✓ 72% believe the workshop will have a 'high' impact on their ability to negotiate a fair salary for themselves and 38% indicated it will have 'some' impact

✓ 72% believe the workshop will have a 'high' Sara Lautenba a recent AAU recipient from fornia branch.

Note: The other options were 'a little' or 'no' impact.

√ 80% indicate they are 'extremely' likely to implement the ideas/concepts from the workshop and 20% indicate they are 'somewhat' likely. Note: the other options are 'not very' or 'not at all' likely to implement.

Pre- and post-workshop surveys indicate a lot was learned. Special appreciation was expressed around the learning about:

- The timing for salary negotiations ideally deflect the discussion to after an offer,
- How to research and prepare for the negotiation market info is available on the web and colleagues and friends can help you understand your unique value, and
- Specific language for use in negotiating.
