At the October General Meeting, two representatives from *The League of Women Voters* will present a non-partisan description of the seventeen ballot measures on the November ballot. We will be educated about who wrote each initiative, who supports and opposes it, and the pros and cons.

They will provide a short written description of each measure that our members can take with them. A short sample ballot will also be provided so that members can keep track of how they intend to vote after hearing the League's presentation.

AAUW has evaluated the measures related to its priorities and mission and has taken a position on five of them.

... From LAURA'S DESK

I was reviewing the OML Branch Statements in the beginning of our Directory and then reading our Bylaws in preparation for the coming year as president of the branch. I was reminded of why I was attracted to AAUW-OML. Attending the State and National Conventions over the last 18 months I was impressed by the work and in awe of the women in the AAUW organization and their commitment to the mission of AAUW.

The American Association of University Women mission strives to advance equity for all women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research.

I personally experienced discrimination in the workplace. I was a woman and a single mother, which equated to significantly less pay and more work to achieve promotions. It included harassment and abuse of power. When I "retired" I wanted to have a purposeful retirement and help make things different for my granddaughters. I wanted them to have an opportunity to achieve their dreams free of discrimination and harassment in the work place. I also had a heart for those struggling in school due to learning differences and economic limitations. At age 63, I went to graduate school and, at age 67, became a licensed therapist working with children and families to empower them to believe in themselves and achieve their dreams.

I became aware of AAUW through Sister-to-Sister, knowing that I had found an organization whose mission aligned with my personal vision of what I wanted for my granddaughters. I wanted to commit my time and resources so that all women and girls have a fair chance and more.

How do we do that through AAUW-OML? By actively participating in our branch activities, supporting the Branch Priorities and the sharing of our skills and talents along with our financial support. Active participation comes in many different forms. **We do not all have to be on the board to play a vital part in the success of our community.** Participation includes helping with mailings, editing the newsletter, selling raffle tickets, contacting members to bring some snacks for a meeting, and setting up or cleaning up after a meeting. It also involves coming to the meetings, joining interests groups and, hopefully, coming to *Cocktails and Conversations* or a new social gathering, *Coffee On Us* – just to name a few ways we can be active.

Participation at any level is so important to the vitality of the group. Showing your support through financial giving to our projects and programs is also part of active participation. I have recently been flooded with emails from AAUW and I don't always have time to read through them. However, I made time for everything in my inbox this week and was once again impressed with everything AAUW presents to its members. We are a part of an amazing organization that dedicates its resources to issues that are important to women. I offer some of 'my' highlights, below....



We know that when women vote, we change the conversation. Politicians and policy makers routinely make decisions on issues that directly affect women and families, but these conversations often lack women's voices. To create real change, women must be part of the conversation and the most powerful place for us to chime in is at the polls. ***When women vote, they determine election results, and then policies can change.***

AAUW has set out some priorities....

- Make sure that you are registered to vote – and talk up voter registration whenever you have the opportunity.
- Have voter registration forms with you. Be informed/educated about issues on the ballot and about candidates
- Vote! Absentee or at the polls on election day, November 8th.

AAUW has some fabulous resources on its national and state websites. Take advantage of the wealth of information that is offered to you. AAUW has prepared some non-partisan guidelines that may assist you with deciding how you will vote. Please access the ***AAUW Action Fund*** to see a comparison of candidates/how they stand on issues relevant to women – national and state by state.

We are at a crossroads. You must be a part of the conversation!

More About *Expanding Your Horizons* (EYH)

The EYH Network is a membership organization of STEM professionals, educators, parents, community leaders, and government and corporate representatives. Financial support comes from membership dues and from donations and grants made by corporations, foundations and government agencies. Currently, EYH conferences for girls are held in 31 states and in Europe and Asia.

The EYH Mission: Inspiring girls to recognize their potential and pursue opportunities in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Through Expanding Your Horizon (EYH) Network programs, we provide STEM role models and hands-on activities for middle and high school girls. Our ultimate goal is to motivate girls to become innovative and creative thinkers ready to meet 21st century challenges.

The EYH Network's programs are based on the following assumptions:

1. In order to increase the participation of women in STEM careers, there must be an increase in the pool of qualified women.
2. Intervention strategies can increase the participation of girls in STEM by nurturing their enjoyment and confidence in these fields, by providing STEM career role models, by connecting math and science courses to career opportunities, and by actively encouraging girls to persevere in math and science coursework and other STEM activities.
3. Many of the most effective interventions begin when girls are in middle school.

The EYH Network began in 1974 as the Math/Science Network, an informal group of women scientists and educators in the San Francisco Bay Area who were concerned about low female participation in math courses. On a volunteer basis, members of the group began planning coordinated efforts to strengthen their individual programs and to offer mutual support.

***Finding the Wow:*
How Dreams Take Flight at Midlife**

Author **MJ Marggraff** is a dynamic member of our Tech Trek Committee. I bought her book to be supportive, and to read her story. What I didn't expect was to be WOWED! Her inspiring true story of losing her day planner and starting from scratch to fill a new appointment book is energizing. When I started reading a few pages before sleep, I read until 5:00 a.m.



Right alongside her in the cockpit of Bravo, I was learning to fly a plane, lifting to the sky from Buchanan Field in Concord. I could see the Delta waters and Mount Diablo out my window. I could smell "chocolate and aviation fuel" in Bravo – that plucky little Cessna that could. MJ's tales are captivating, courageous, and sometimes terrifying. 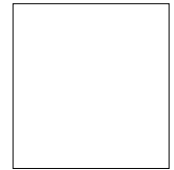
