OML adopted the Burckhalter School Project as a Branch Priority in 1993, and we will have much to celebrate when our 20th year begins in the fall semester.

Burckhalter will begin the new year with over 300 students – a gain of more than 50%.

Twenty volunteers will work in the library and in the classroom.

Each class visits once a week, and the volunteers assist students in book selection, read aloud to groups, teach orientation lessons, as well as perform clerical tasks necessary to keep a library useful and

Tutors work to improve profiency in language arts and mathematics in Kindergarten through 5th grade.


