# SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP FOCUS MOVIES, FOOD & TRAVEL

While our Branch Priorities focus on mission-based projects, many of OML's Special Interest Groups focus on friendship, personal enrichment and just having fun. Three such monthly activities center around what some might even admit to calling life's basics – *entertainment*, *eating and world-wide travel experiences*.

Let's Go to the Movies currently has three groups, all meeting on the third Friday of each month. This is one of two regularly scheduled evening activities that include spouses or SO's (the other being the Travel Group, described below). The format is the same for all three – a movie (or sometimes a DVD) is selected via popular vote, then members watch it at their own convenience before the following month's meeting. These monthy get-togethers include a potluck dinner and discussion of the chosen film, facilitated by one of the members of the group. Each Movie Group has a coordinator who determines the assignments (hostess, facilitator, food providers), the duties for which are rotated each month. #### The BURCKHALTER PROJECT

OML volunteers are celebrating 20 years at the Burckhalter School in Oakland- 1993 - 2013!

kids come running up and wrap me in their big hugs - that really makes my time with them special. When I have been working with a student to conquer a certain lesson, and they finally 'get it', I give them a high five and they grin ear to ear and that makes it all worthwhile. And when students I worked with a year or two before run up to me and, after a big hug, tell me what they are accomplishing, I really feel that I have made a difference. Tutoring is exciting, fun and rewarding!"

The children, she says, are learning to appreciate Burckhalter and all the opportunities they have to learn.

December is the month of holidays and the library will have an array of books about Hanukah, Christmas, Kwanza and Eid, and the students will learn while having fun. # FOCUS ON ... OML'S COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAMS

#### SISTER-to-SISTER NEWS

#### SISTER-TO-SISTER 2013/14 IS LAUNCHED!

Excitement and energy reverberate in the meeting room as twenty-four high school girls gather in preparation for a Summit with middle school girls in March.

S2S brings together a diverse group of girls to address issues that schools often cannot adequately address. These issues include sexual harassment, violence, early sexual activity, bullying, cliques, boys and self-esteem, shyness, substance abuse, eating disorders and body image—the perils of adolescence.

Beginning in September, carefully selected local high school girls, from 9th through 12th grade, meet once a month for three hours on a Sunday. The training includes fundraising, publicity, marketing, and facilitation, culminating in the Summit, for which they are responsible from set up to clean up. With adult guidance these high school facilitators practice, plan, prepare, produce and hone skills that they will use the rest of their lives. Junior and senior girls come an hour earlier to acquire additional leadership skills that they will use throughout the program. Many of the high school girls find the process so rewarding that they return year after year.

The big day arrives: the Summit. All of the planning comes together and the high school girls and the middle school girls meet at last, giving the middle school girls an opportunity to talk about their fears and frustrations, their dreams and ideas. Sister-to-sister friendships emerge. In the words of one girl, "We are all unique and amazing. We underestimate ourselves by thinking things like, 'I'm not pretty enough, I'm not smart

enough. 'Every girl is truly beautiful just the way she is, inside and out."

This year the girls must raise \$1,000 to cover the costs of the program and fundraising is underway. Teens and their adult guides are seeking sponsors for various daily activities such as running a certain distance or practicing an instrument.

#### SISTER-TO-SISTER EXPANDS!

Last fall the Superintendent of the Moraga School District and the Principal at Joaquin Moraga Middle School (JM) met with Valarie Burgess and Laura Wittenberg to discuss the possibility of a program for middle school girls focusing on relationships and communications. They hoped this program might help change the culture among the young girls at JM. Valarie and Laura agreed to work on such a program and spent a week in Boston becoming certified in conflict resolution, communications and leadership skills for girls at The Girl's Leadership Institute, founded by Rachel Simmons, author of "The Curse of the Good Girl." They also completed a certification with Hardy Girls, another girl's leadership and mentor program.

As of the first week of October, 15 girls in the sixth grade at JM have registered in their workshop, along with three S2S High School Facilitators. In this new program, the girls are taught how to navigate their world more effectively. This is a six-week pilot program, which Valarie and Laura hope to expand at JM and take to the other area middle schools.

To date they have led three one and a half hour seminars with the girls and have three more meetings to go. Morgan Matranga, a Junior at Campolinda High School and one of the S2S High School Facilitators working with the girls, wrote: "Through the workshop, the middle school girls are learning how to effectively communicate with others. The high school facilitators are honing in their facilitation skills in preparation for the March S2S summit."
