Volunteers *DO* make a Difference!

"I am impressed and delighted with our students' improvement in reading scores," beamed Mrs. Geathers, the principal of Burckhalter Elementary School, as she talked with a group of OML library volunteers last spring, *"And I believe that the volunteers in the library and in the classrooms are making big difference in our students' achievements."*

If **YOU** have been looking for a volunteer opportunity, now is the time to talk to us about the rewards of working at this wonderful, but underserved school, conveniently located in East Oakland, just one block off of Highway 13. You will be warmly welcomed by the teachers & the students!

OML's Burckhalter Project has been a Branch Priority since 1994. Yes, for 20 years we have staffed the all-volunteer library and provided tutors in the classrooms. Our volunteers commit to ½ or one day a week. Our tutors are matched with a teacher and grade level, and then a schedule is worked out that is convenient for all. With 12 dedicated volunteers on hand, the library will be open 3 days a week this year: Monday, Wednesday and Thursday. This is a very enthusiastic, creative and congenial group and they will be happy to welcome some new helpers for the 2014-15 year. **Ruth Balsdon, Pat Beckner, Arlene Downes, Callie Gilbert, Mary Ellen Judson, Mary Levey, Alison Mackenzie, Mary Olowin, Therese Tamaro** and **Kanan Shah** would all love to talk to *YOU*.

Returning to tutor for her 20th year, **K. de Groot** writes, *"... it's 'my kids' and their affectionate and positive responses that keep pulling me back. When they succeed and feel good about themselves... I'm on a high!"*

Carrol Foxall, who has tutored for 16 years, writes that she is excited about the influx in recent years of students from the Middle East, Africa, South-East Asia and the Pacific Islands and has noticed how easily our predominately African American and Hispanic student body accepts other cultures. She adds, *"My hope is that this diversity will lead us to a more peaceful world."*

Our tutors also include **Jan Coe**, who returns yearly to work with the first grade teacher, and two who do double duty with the library: **Therese Tamaro**, who tutors 5th grade students in Math, and **Ruth Balsdon**, who tutors in reading and social studies. All of our volunteers will be happy to talk to **YOU** about the rewards of working with our delightful students.

TECH TREK CAMPERS RELEASE THEIR “INNER SCIENTIST”

Since 1998, our AAUW OML branch has granted a total of 59 scholarships to Tech Trek camp, a science and math camp for local middle school girls. Statewide this year, about 800 middle school girls attended 10 Tech Trek camps and the program has now expanded to seven additional states.

Our six 2014 Tech Trekkers attended the Grace Hopper Tech Trek Camp at Stanford University: Jane Fong and Dara Kazmierowski from Orinda Intermediate School, Ally Scarpitti and Sharon Yuan from Joaquin Moraga Intermediate School, and Sofia Elise West and Claire Gallagher from Stanley Intermediate School. The camp was kicked off by an inspiring speech by Ellen Le, a former Tech Trekker who graduated from Stanford in Chemical Engineering last year, and works for a startup perfume company. She challenged the girls to celebrate their interest in STEM classes (embrace your inner nerd!). The girls, returning from the Tech Trek camp this summer, spoke of fabulous “hands on” experiences at a recent reception held in their honor:

- Constructing a robot with sensors and programmable actions (like turning a figure 8 or slamming a golf ball)
- Learning how to suture from a veterinarian--dissecting a squid
- Creating a group machine during an improv session
- Going on impressive field trips, including a visit to see a solar-powered full-size automobile
- Constructing balloon-powered and mousetrap-powered car models designed for long travel or for speed
- Extracting DNA from strawberries
- Visiting NASA with a behind-the-scenes tour including the astronaut training simulators and a wind tunnel
- Touring the Stanford Blood Lab
- Building the Golden Gate Bridge with newspapers
- Experiencing another world through a virtual reality headset
- Viewing the planet Saturn and other phenomena in huge telescopes after dark
- Listening to a researcher with current experience in Antarctica
- Staging a murder mystery in the dorm after a forensics session.

The girls also participated in Professional Women’s Night – sort of like “speed dating” for the girls to meet and ask questions of 12 women with STEM-related careers. OML dorm mom **Jan Cushman** kept very busy with the six OML campers and six additional girls (from other districts) in her dorm group – facilitating the girls’ week so they optimized their learning and their adventure. **Gail Chesler** served as dorm mom at the UC Davis Tech Trek Camp, which offered comparable classes and field trips for similarly wonderful girls.

Everyone left camp with huge smiles on their faces, many unique experiences and a world of promise.

Helping Students Master the Fundamentals of Test Taking

The Scholarship Committee has moved quickly to help high school students prepare for the SAT and ACT college entrance exams. Member **Lisa Geary** is working with Miramonte High School and the Princeton Review to host practice test/assessment workshops for sophomore students and their parents.

On October 25th students will take the practice test at Miramonte. They will return with their parents on December 11th to learn of their strengths and areas of focus for each test. Explanations for every question are also included during this presentation.

Our committee arranges for the classrooms and provides proctors for the test. The Princeton Review pays for the rooms and donates \$25 to AAUW for each registered student. At this time over 80 students have signed up!

Students who are graduating in the Class of 2017 and beyond are taking the new redesigned SAT. If you know someone who falls into this category be sure to have them go to oml-ca.aauw.net, and look under Scholarships for more information and to sign up for the practice test.

SISTER-TO-SISTER EMPOWERS GIRLS

Sister-to-Sister is a six-month commitment annually for OML's trainers and their team of high school girls. It is important that we put to rest the notion that it is only a one-day event that happens in March. From recruitment as school begins in August, seven meetings of three hours each are held to prepare girls for their leadership role at the Summit.

Our goal, which we have been fulfilling for fifteen years, is to empower them on many levels, in their personal as well as public lives. They learn listening and questioning skills to take conversations deeper. They learn to manage groups and different personalities. They present ideas and make a case to have them adopted, lead decision-making discussions and practice facilitating small groups. Through many games and activities, they get to know each other and become an enthusiastic and caring team.

The girls quickly realize these skills can be applied in many arenas of their lives, and they become better daughters and friends. One of the most important gifts they receive is the opportunity to share their stories, their tragedies and triumphs. They are heard, seen and acknowledged. This is the gift they are able to pass on to the younger girls each March, as well as their wisdom and insights.

In addition, returning girls who want to take on more responsibility become part of the leadership team, gaining even more enriching experiences. It is our privilege to offer this empowering experience to teens in our communities. The generosity of AAUW members and community organizations make all of this possible; our donors are partners in empowering generations of young women.

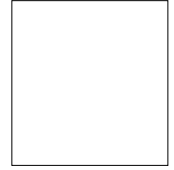
