The topic is “**Preparing Middle and High School Girls for an Education/Career in STEM-Related Fields.**” TechBridge Girls provides STEM programs for girls

and supports teachers and others with training and STEM resources, so Ms. Esho knows her topic well.

FOCUS ON ... The UPCOMING STEAM CONFERENCE

2019 AAUW-EYH STEAM CONFERENCE at Saint Mary's College: MARCH 23, 2019

Workshops are the heart of the STEAM Conference. Each girl will enroll in three interactive workshops, focused on science, technology, engineering, art and math-related activities.

Conference Goals

- To ignite girls' passion for STEAM through hands-on experiences
- To provide young women with opportunities to meet and interact with positive role models
- To foster awareness of STEAM careers

Following is the first of our profiles of the STEAM Conference workshops.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is made up of 29 agencies and offices with nearly 100,000 employees who serve the American people at more than 4,500 locations across the country and abroad, providing leadership on food, agriculture, natural resources, rural development, nutrition, and related issues. As part of its scientific work, the USDA-ARS Research Project, 'Domestic Production of Natural Rubber and Industrial Seed Oils,' addresses specific technical challenges of developing commercially-viable domestic supplies of natural rubber from crops grown in the U.S.

This year's AAUW STEAM conference is delighted to welcome **Dr. Colleen McMahan** as a workshop presenter on this topic. She is a Research Chemist and the Lead Scientist of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service project on "Natural Rubber Producing Industrial Crops" in Albany, California. She completed her undergraduate Chemistry and M. S. Polymer Science degrees at The University of Akron, Ohio, and her Doctorate in Physical Chemistry at l'Université de Haute-Alsace in Mulhouse, France. At the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company, she worked in rubber compound science and later management of Physical Test Laboratories in support of tire compound development. At Advanced Elastomer Systems, L.P., an ExxonMobil company, Colleen led global product development of thermoplastic elastomers. Since joining ARS her research interests include bio-based rubber and industrial oils, and the new and established crop plants that produce them, with emphasis on the biochemistry and molecular biology of rubber biosynthesis.



Natural rubber is a strategic biobased material essential to

medicine, defense and industrial manufacturing in the United States. The U.S. relies on imports to meet domestic needs. Natural rubber was formerly produced by U.S. agriculture, but critical issues denied sustainability. The USDA-ARS Research Project 'Domestic Production of Natural Rubber and Industrial Seed Oils' addresses specific technical challenges of developing commercially-viable domestic supplies of natural rubber from crops grown in the U.S.

Successful completion of this research will

1. Advance commercialization of secure, safe and sustainable sources of natural rubber in the U.S.,
2. Contribute to rural development and green jobs,
3. Replace petroleum-based rubber and oils in medical, industrial, and consumer products, and
4. Transfer technology through dissemination of research results.

The middle school girls attending the March STEAM Conference will participate in a hands-on activity in which latex will be collected from rubber-producing plants. Students will use molds and pre-compounded latex to prepare gloves or booties. The chemistry involved will be discussed at each step. Each student will leave the workshop with a small rubber article they have prepared, and with an increased awareness of the types of STEAM careers available in government service.

This conference has allowed me to enjoy taking more STEAM-related classes at school and also has provided me opportunities to work with other organizations such as the Lamorinda Sunrise Rotary. I am glad to be working with people who have the same mission to empower girls in STEAM and I'm looking forward to making this upcoming conference a success.

PUBLIC POLICY YEAR END UPDATE

- The Federal Commission on School Safety led by Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos released a report detailing their recommendations for schools. The report provides few suggestions for directly addressing gun violence. Instead it now includes provisions for the training of school personnel in the use of firearms. In addition, the Trump administration rescinded Obama-era school discipline guidance that aimed to address disproportionately high disciplinary rates for students of color. AAUW urges the administration to reverse this action and instead reaffirm their commitment to supporting equal rights and opportunity for all.
- President Donald Trump rejected a bi-partisan Senate budget proposal leading to a partial federal government shutdown at midnight December 21.
- Last week, the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas ruled in favor of a group of Republican attorneys general who argued that the Affordable Care Act (ACA) is unconstitutional. Weakening or removing the protections of the ACA would eradicate years of progress in expanding women's access to health care, and AAUW is committed to fighting against any such attempts.

• One thing AAUW asks of us:

Every two years, AAUW members vote on revisions to our Public Policy Priorities. Now through January 11, 2019, you can comment on and indicate support for the changes recommended by the AAUW Public Policy Committee. Be sure to take advantage of this opportunity to submit feedback on AAUW's 2019-2021 Public Policy Priorities!

Bunmi Esho has 20 years experience in the corporate, non-profit and education sectors. Prior to joining Techbridge Girls, she lived in Southeast Asia leading education programs and managing teams with local nonprofits, schools and most recently, the first and only science center in Cambodia as Program Director. In her career she has also worked in the software industry, taught chemistry and science, and sat on several nonprofit boards.

Bunmi is a first generation American who has lived in the United States, Nigeria and Cambodia. She has a BS in chemical engineering from the University of Texas and an MS in education from the University of Arizona.

“Find your tribe – girls like you, those younger and those older, and stay connected,” she says. “Celebrate your victories with your tribe but also share your challenges.” Bunmi believes that all women need a support system and it's a support system that will carry them through the good and the bad.

Promoting Education for Girls

Our branch scholarship committee echoes the voice of National AAUW by supporting young women graduates from our three high schools and two undergraduates from Saint Mary’s College. The high school seniors receive college scholarships. The Saint Mary’s students are given scholarships to AAUW’s National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) in Baltimore, Maryland. We search for girls who learn self-awareness and leadership skills through their desire to help others and make a difference in their community. This is the third of four articles showcasing our 2018 awardees.

Madeline Kalil
Acalanes High School
University of Pennsylvania



As a member of the California Academy of Sciences Teen Advocates for Science Communication Program, Madeline engaged with the academy’s scientists and staff to develop and facilitate science content and deliver education programs for the Academy’s visitors. Women in this program, along with members of the Lawrence Hall of Science, encouraged and inspired Madeline to become an advocate for younger girls and STEM.

While at Acalanes Madeline maintained a 4.6 GPA and was a member of the Volleyball and Track and Field Teams. She was a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Board and participated in the Girls Who Code Club.

Madeline’s community service included STEM-related activities. She was a volunteer member of the California Academy of Sciences: TASC Force and participated in the global platform Maker’s Faire. In the summer of 2017 Madeline designed, organized and taught a class for middle school girls to help them become comfortable with and interested in coding. For two summers she participated in the University of California, Berkeley, Girls in Engineering Camp as a counselor and at the Lawrence Hall of Science as a lab instructor.

In the summer of 2017 Madeline was the first high school Scholar at Brainstorm, the Stanford Laboratory for Brain Health and Entrepreneurship. The founder and director wrote a glowing letter of recommendation for her. One of Madeline’s projects at the laboratory was to mentor a Stanford masters degree student who pitched *Brainstorm*, her dissertation work, a mobile app to educate undergrads about depression and suicide. “Madeline’s mentorship of this student nearly a decade older than her is a clear testament of her brilliance; she was able to help the graduate student understand the problem from a unique perspective . . .”

Madeline is attending the University of Pennsylvania where she will major in computer science. She states: “I have been fortunate to have my women mentors who have supported and encouraged my interest in STEM, so as a college student, and as a leader in industry or academia someday, I intend to do the same.”

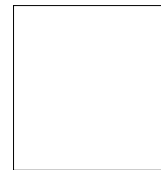
