With fiction, the kids look for books that they are familiar with. The library volunteers often have to act as enthusiastic saleswomen, selling an unknown title. Large non-fiction books with lots of pictures also go over well.

PUBLIC POLICY REPORT



Roe v. Wade Under Attack!

May, the month for celebrating mothers, saw renewed attacks on women's well-being. Alabama recently joined eight other states (Mississippi, Ohio, Georgia, Missouri, Kentucky, Arkansas, Utah and Iowa) in enacting draconian anti-abortion legislation. The just-signed Alabama law criminalizes abortions six weeks after conception (before a pregnancy is even confirmed). Legislation that would prohibit an abortion once a fetal heartbeat is detected (a standard utilized in the Mississippi, Ohio, Georgia, Kentucky and Iowa laws) is also nearing passage in Louisiana. A state judge in Iowa declared its law unconstitutional, and the laws in Ohio, Mississippi, Kentucky and Utah have been temporarily stayed. These laws are squarely counter to *Roe v. Wade* and challenge a woman's right to reproductive freedom. They likely will need to be addressed by the United States Supreme Court in which the recent appointments of Justices Gorsuch and Kavanaugh may tip the balance in favor of overturning *Roe*.

Attacks on women's health care and reproductive rights are also coming from the federal government. These anti-women federal actions include recent administration rules that allow health care providers to refuse to provide services based on their religious beliefs and the Department of Health and Human Services Title X "gag rule" that prohibits providers who receive Title X funding from discussing abortion with their patients.

AAUW has joined other advocates in the *#StopTheBans* campaign, a national day of action to demand access to reproductive health care. AAUW will also continue to join legal briefs arguing against these state and federal actions, and lobby at the state and federal level to stop policies that curtail reproductive rights or limit equal access to healthcare.

Women Hurt Most by Student Loan Crisis

President Trump has submitted a revised budget request that would remove \$3.9 billion of funding for Pell Grants. Federal Pell Grant subsidies are limited to students with financial need, who have not earned their first bachelor's degree.

AAUW is encouraging Congress to safeguard and expand Pell Grants and other forms of student aid. Young women are especially vulnerable since women hold almost two thirds of the country's student debt and many also face unaffordable access to child care. Reducing loan debt, in addition to narrowing the pay gap, would help ensure future economic security for many young women.

Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)

On March 22, 1972, the Senate passed the Equal Rights Amendment to the United States Constitution, which proposed banning discrimination based on sex. ... The passed Equal Rights Amendment read, "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

To become the law of the land it needed to be ratified by 3/4th of the states – i.e. 38 of the 50 states. Congress gave the states until 1982 to ratify the amendment. The amendment fell three votes short with 35 voting to ratify. In the past year, however, two more states have voted to ratify – Nevada and Illinois. Supporters believe (hope) that if an additional state votes to ratify, the 1982 deadline will be held to be inoperable or that Congress will simply vote to remove the deadline. Supporters are focusing on the following 13 states to reach the magic number of 38: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia.

AAUW State affiliates in these 13 states are working to make their state the thirty eighth to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment.

Another Partial Step Forward "The Equality Act"

The House of Representatives recently passed the AAUW supported "Equality Act." This is a groundbreaking civil rights bill that would ensure educational protections for LGBT students among other protections. It still needs to secure Senate and Presidential approval.

AAUW will continue working until every student has equal access to education.
