Greetings. As I write this, I am getting ready for Thanksgiving. I want to start by saying thank you to YOU, our branch members. You are generous in giving your time, talent, and donations to our branch. I figured out that close to 50 percent of our members serve on the board of directors and/or on committees that do the work of our branch. And so many of you make financial contributions that allow us to have so many accomplishments. We just couldn't do it without what you give to the branch. *Thank you.*

For the first time ever, the AAUW National Board of Directors will match – dollar for dollar – every contribution to AAUW National's Greatest Needs Fund from November to end of December 2019, up to a total of \$68,800. You received the AAUW Fund donation letter in November. I encourage you to contribute to AAUW National, if you haven't already done so. Your donation will have double the impact, and help us meet our branch's 5-Star Program goal. *Thank you.*

Speaking of the **5-Star Program**, our board did meet to discuss this and what additional actions we will take to ensure we get recognition for our contributions to meeting AAUW's strategic plan:

1. Programs – We expect to earn this star. We have and will continue to hold at least three strategic plan-related programs focusing on economic security, Work Smart (holding a Work Smart session in February), Operation Equity (we just had a speaker on Title IX), etc. We will also complete the community resource mapping exercise.
2. Advancement – Our branch does meet the goal of donating \$30 per capita for greatest needs fund. We hope to retain 90 percent of our members at renewal, to earn this star.
3. Communications & External Relations – We will earn this star as our website and social media (Facebook) includes an economic security focus, a link to Work Smart online and Two-Minute Activist, and monthly posts on AAUW priorities.
4. Public Policy and Research – We will earn this star as we plan to meet with our US and State representatives by June 2020; we have public policy chairs who will coordinate with our State public policy chair; and we collect Action Network signups at our events.
5. Governance and Sustainability – We hope to earn this star. We do align our planning with State and AAUW National Strategic Plans and will work on our succession plan to ensure new ideas and perspectives are included in future leadership. (We encourage new members to join our leadership team – it is time well spent.)

So you can see our branch is aligned with state and national priorities, we do engage in public policy issues; and, through our branch STEM conference, Tech Trek, Scholarship, and work at Burckhalter, we have many initiatives that advance the longterm goal of achieving equity for women and girls. I will ensure our activities are documented at the National level.

I am looking forward to the holiday parties. I will be at Peggy Cabaniss's home on Tuesday, December 10 from 4-7 pm for the evening social, and at Marie Bonilla's on Thursday, December 12 from 10-12 for coffee and snacks. Sixteen board members were present at the November board meeting.

Mary Ann McLeod reported that 60 people had signed up for Game Day.

Tech Trek chair, Jan Cushman, reported that AAUW CA is requiring each branch sending students to camp to sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). A motion was made and seconded to sign the MOU, unanimously approved by the board.

Stacia Cragholm reported that Isabelle Katz (a former Tech Trekker and STEM ambassador) placed first at the Broadcom National Conference. Look for a link on our OML website about her. We learned that Tech Bridge is absorbing EYH and coordinating the Chevron funding of \$5,000 for the STEM Conference in March 2020.

Gail Chesler reported that the holiday parties will be on December 10 from 4-7 pm at Peggy Cabaniss' home and on December 12 from 10 am to 12 noon at Marie Bonilla's home. There was a discussion about getting one of our advertisers, The Image Studio, to give a short presentation at the first party and a business that focuses on decluttering, recommended by Marie, for the other. Gail also reported that two candidates will speak on the census for the January meeting and she will talk with Sara Lautenbach about a Work and Start Smart program for February 23, which will be a Sunday afternoon meeting held at the Lafayette Library.

FOCUS ON ... THE STEM CONFERENCE • MARCH 21, 2020**Keynote Speaker, Jane Chen**

Jane Chen is the co-founder and CEO of *Embrace Innovations*, which developed a ground-breaking low-cost infant incubator. The Embrace infant warmer costs about one

percent of a traditional incubator and is estimated to have saved over 300,000 babies across 22 countries, including many in Africa. The product works without a constant supply of electricity, making it suitable for remote parts of the world.

Jane was selected as one of Forbes' Impact 30 and as a Young Global Leader by the World Economic Forum. She is a TED Fellow and the winner of many achievement awards. Jane received her MBA from Stanford Graduate School of Business, and her Masters in Public Administration from Harvard Kennedy School of Government. She is also an avid surfer and meditator, and writes a personal blog and a column for Forbes about life lessons learned through surfing and entrepreneurship.

Over 20 STEM Workshop Presenters Planned

Many of the workshop presenters at last year's conference will be returning this year, however there are a few new ones.

Ann Drevno, Sustainability Director at Saint Mary's College of California, is one of them. She will be introducing the concept of "sustainability" and be discussing considerations in designing a sustainable living area. Each participant will be giving a map of an area to be developed, along with components to include in designing a sustainable city and environmental principals to consider in development. Students will then work with three partners in designing a Sustainable City.

OML Tech Trekker and STEM Ambassador, Places in the Finals in Mathematics in Broadcom MASTERS Competition!

Isabelle Katz was one of 30 finalists from around the U.S. who were selected from over 2,300 middle school students at the national **Broadcom MASTERS® competition** in Washington, D.C. in October. Isabelle was invited to participate in the competition after winning first place at the 2019 California State Science Fair in the physics category. Her project characterized musical instruments (piano and violin) and voice, using signal analysis. Isabelle states that the next step for this project is to build a working smartphone app to train singers.



Isabelle attended Tech Trek Camp Hopper in 2018. She is now a freshman at Campolindo High School in Moraga and remains active in our STEM conference at Saint Mary's College. A dedicated musician, singer and triathlete participant, Isabelle hopes to become a science teacher.

Broadcom MASTERS® (Math, Applied Science, Technology and Engineering for Rising Stars) is the premier middle school science and engineering research competition in the United States. Thirty finalists were selected to present their research projects in Washington, DC, and compete in hands-on team STEM challenges that test their abilities in twenty first century skills – critical thinking, collaboration, communication and creativity – through project-based learning.

When the winners were announced this year, the stage looked a little different than previous years – for the first time ever, the top prize winners were all girls and among the 30 finalists, over half were girls!

November General Meeting With Alicia Hetman



Alicia Hetman, current Title IX chair of AAUW California, and a national expert on Title IX, spoke at the November general meeting to an enthusiastic gathering that included, Cynthia St. Ange (Title IX investigator), Megan Gallagher (Director of the Campus Assault Response and Education Center) and representatives from Saint Mary's College.

Ms. Hetman's very detailed presentation was preceded by table discussions on how Title IX had affected attendees personally and/or their families. Her remarks included the history of civil rights laws regarding sex that led up to the landmark 1972 Title

IX federal civil rights law that prohibits sex discrimination in education. The law covers women and men, girls and boys, and staff and students in any educational institution or program that receives federal funds. We learned that Title IX requires recipients to designate a Title IX coordinator, evaluate their institution's current policies and practices, adopt and publish a policy against sex discrimination, and implement grievance procedures that provide for prompt and equitable resolution of student and employee discrimination complaints.

Although Title IX has had many positive effects in schools in the last 47 years, especially in sports, much work remains. Title IX coordinators, if one has been designated, often lack the support, guidance and training needed to complete their work. Monetary support and teeth have been sorely lacking. Ever since its passage, opponents have sought to weaken it. Recently, the US Department of Education (DOE) has proposed a rule change which would weaken protections by narrowing the definition of sexual-harassment and by altering when schools must respond to reports of sexual-harassment and violence. Ms. Hetman was the AAUW state official responsible for drafting the letter sent to the DOE detailing AAUW CA's opposition to the proposed changes in the current law.

Ms. Hetman's presentation included narratives that gender discrimination begins in preschool with uneven treatment of boys and girls. For example, overlooking aggressive or passive behavior in one but not the other can contribute to expectations. Her passionate presentation ended with a plea for all present to develop "gender eyes" looking to recognize subtle discrimination and to speak up. Specific actions she recommended were signing up to be an AAUW Two-Minute-Activist, writing letters to Secretary of DOE, Betsy DeVos, and keeping this issue in the forefront of our conversations with local elected officials.

SPECIAL BURCKHALTER REPORT



A couple of years ago, after fifth grade graduation, a Burckhalter volunteer commented that it was a shame that so many of the best Burckhalter students ended up at one of the worst middle schools in the district, simply because the middle school was the neighborhood school for children living near Burckhalter.

The following year in November we offered an orientation in the library on how to apply to middle school for 5th graders. The open enrollment period for middle school applications runs from November to early February, the school year before enrollment. Probably many families are not even thinking about middle school in November when their child has just started fifth grade. The fifth grade teacher was also initially skeptical about whether the whole process was just a waste of time, as she believed the slots in the better middle schools were filled with the children living close to those schools. But she was wrong – some Burckhalter kids were accepted into the better middle schools. So we have continued the orientation each November, letting kids know that they have an option of where to go for middle school.

There are 47 different schools in the Oakland Unified School District with a sixth grade. The quick orientation we provide during a 30 minute library period shows the kids the website where the different alternatives can be explored. We let them know that the deadline for the 2020 school year is February 7. Although parents can apply online, we also know that many Burckhalter parents either don't have a computer or may not be computer literate. So we hand out a written copy of the four-page, legal size application document to each fifth grader which can be mailed in by the parent. This year the school district declined to make copies of the written application, so the copies were paid for by you, through your contributions to Burckhalter and AAUW.

Middle school can be tough for any child, but we believe that getting into a good middle school program can make all the difference in a child's school career and future. You can also make a difference by volunteering at Burckhalter either in the library or as a tutor for just a few hours a week. We always need more people. Contact Joanie Jump for more information.

Samantha Nieves, Class of 2021, \$1200 Award

As a first-generation Latina attending Saint Mary's, Samantha was given the opportunity to learn that she can help change the lives of others through community advocacy and action. As part of the *Gael Sisterhood*, an inclusive women's club on campus, she has volunteered at the Center for Women and Gender Equity. Samantha has been inspired by her community engagement at Saint Mary's and wants to be a strong woman leader. She shared with me her goals for attending the conference: "I want to learn about other women's experiences and see how I can grow and learn from their success and challenges."



Here are more quotes from Samantha:

I am honestly so grateful to have had the opportunity to attend NCCWSL, and I hope that many more women at Saint Mary's have the same opportunity.

My favorite workshop was Internship 101 because as a college student looking for internships, I have struggled to find one because I do not feel qualified. ... The Leader of the workshop, also named Samantha, told us that women will not apply for a job or internships if they don't meet all the qualifications. Men will apply even if they are only 60 percent qualified. It is interesting to me that women strive for perfection and still do not receive the pay they deserve.

Another workshop that I enjoyed was the Start Smart, because it explained equal pay and how women should negotiate their pay during job interviews. I think, as a woman who is entering the workforce, negotiating my salary is one of the best options for acquiring equal pay. I believe that this workshop should be implemented at Saint Mary's because many women on campus don't have this information to prepare them for their future jobs.

INTER BRANCH COUNCIL REPORT

The Interbranch Council (IBC) for Contra Costa County consists of representatives from the nine AAUW branches within the county. It meets every other month from September through May to share ideas and work on joint projects. At the November IBC meeting, Ann Flynn of the Diablo Valley League of Women Voters spoke about the League's availability to help with any upcoming branch activities surrounding the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage, the upcoming census and the upcoming election. The League of Women Voters was established by the same group of suffragettes who helped women get the right to vote, as they realized that voters would need education. The League is participating with Saint Mary's Women's Studies Department in a panel discussion about women's history and looking forward on a date to be announced in March. Voter registration will be very active in January to get people registered by Feb 3 for the March primary. The League is doing training in how to register people as well as running registration events. The League will be available in September and October 2020 for meetings on the pros and cons of the propositions on the November ballot. The League is also working on the 2020 census which will be the first census to be largely online. (Sounds like our January general meeting on the census will be right on point, when you think of the problems of counting people who either don't have computers or are not computer literate.)

The Danville/Alamo/Walnut Creek holiday house tour is back on this year, after not being held last year. The tour is of six houses in the San Ramon Valley, all festively decorated for the holidays. This event, held Friday, December 13 and Saturday, December 14 from 1 am to 4 pm benefits their scholarship and Tech Trek programs. Tickets are \$35 and are available on their branch website, daw-ca.aauw.net.

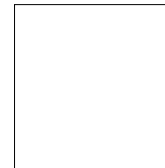
