Our three panelists are well-informed and currently working or teaching in these fields. They are **Alka Madan** of Bay Area Immigration Services, **Mahvash Hassan**, an independent consultant, and OML branch member, **Dr. Zaida McCall**.

We'll start off being interested and informed by discussing *How do immigrants get into this country?* Did you know there are 26 different visas, with different rules and quotas, and different approximate numbers of holders of such visas now residing here. This is a topic very much in the newspapers and on the evening news and talk shows.



The second panelist will help us understand the effect on our economy, our culture, and our crime statistics as a result of the presence of the immigrants and some of their families. There are truths being spoken and there are un-truths being spoken. Who is to know is which is which? All the myths ... how accurate are they?

Our third panelist will share some insights on at least one major influx of immigrants and the nation and culture that received them.

Following the panelists' sharing, there will be an extended Q&A – that part of the meeting can get down into the interesting “weeds.”

It was an excellent program, with lots of participation, great tips and practice on how to negotiate salary and benefits. Several of the women who attended were in the process of negotiating their salaries, and appreciated the resource. Work Smart is a concrete way in which AAUW is helping women reach pay equity. We had about 10 members of the public attend, plus several members from the Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek Branch, who partnered with us to sponsor the program.

One of my goals as president was to offer the Work Smart program to our community. Check! Another goal was to have some of our programs scheduled during times that working women can attend. We had an evening program last year, and this Sunday afternoon program. Check! The purpose was to offer programs of interest to members of the community, specifically working women, as well as to demonstrate what AAUW-OML has to offer.

FOCUS ON ... STEM CONFERENCE • MARCH 21

Franceska Hinkamp Keynote Speaker at the STEM Conference



Franceska Hinkamp, a Pediatric Genetic Counselor at the UCLA Institute for Precision Health, certainly did not start out with a STEM related career in her sights. Social justice, empowering young people in the child welfare system, and supporting transitioning foster teens through resource connection was her passion. Franceska's enthusiasm and skill in bringing the social and physical sciences together to pioneer a new career, genetic counseling, is a story worth hearing. Franceska received her BA in Sociology as class valedictorian and Davies Forum Scholar from University of San Francisco in 2012. Her honors thesis was titled "*Going to the Dark Side: A Sociological Analysis of Pre-Teen 'Glitz' Beauty Pageants.*"

After college she joined the Jesuit Volunteer Corps and committed to a year of service in an underserved community in rural Washington state. In her role as an employment program and housing coordinator for youth in the foster care system, she recognized the impact that a supportive person could have at a time when a person feels powerless. She went on to work for The Mockingbird Society, a leading youth advocacy organization based in Seattle during which time she trained youth to be their best advocates by using their stories to inform legislative solutions to systemic problems in the foster care system.

Her incidental discovery of the field of genetic counseling led to her "ah ha!" moment. In this quickly growing clinical field, she recognized an opportunity to merge her social science background and advocacy experience with the exciting advances in medical genetics. She attended graduate school at Northwestern University, Chicago, Illinois – one of the top schools in Genetic Counseling – and earned her Master's of Science degree in Human Genetics.

Today, she provides pioneering genetic counseling in pediatrics, adult medical genetics, neonatal intensive care and pediatric cancer predisposition at UCLA in Los Angeles. She was recently awarded the National Society of Genetic Counseling Best Student Abstract Award at the National Society of Genetic Counselors Conference in Salt Lake City.

On a personal note, Franceska participated in the Sister-to-Sister Summit hosted by AAUW as a middle schooler in 2002 and again as a mentor in high school in 2008. She shares, "that day as a participant shifted the way I thought about my social identity as a young woman and my participation as a mentor was meaningful and helped to shape my leadership abilities." Outside of work, Franceska enjoys practicing hot yoga, cooking up vegan feasts for friends and family and training her dog at a canine agility gym.

We are very excited to share with our members the keynote speaker for the Parent Education Workshop to be held at Saint Mary's College in the Soda Center, Clay's Hall as part of the STEM program. **Dr. Rand Morimoto**, Ph.D is the former Cybersecurity Advisor to the White House and a Saint Mary's College Trustee who has been in the tech industry for over 40 years.

Dr. Rand Morimoto has also worked in academics to bridge fundamental knowledge and learning in a tech-driven global environment. Dr. Morimoto has written dozens of books on safety and security on the Internet including a recently published book titled *Is That Really True? – How Disinformation Dangerously Impacts Our Thinking*, focusing on the use (and misuse) of social media in the distribution of individual perspectives and opinions that are frequently misinterpreted as facts. He will provide guidance on what parents can do in helping their teenagers better understand the role each individual plays in their own cyber protection and security as they navigate the digital world around them.

University of California, Berkeley

Genie Lee spent four years working on Campolindo's La Puma magazine. Her senior year she was co-editor in chief and lifestyle editor. Genie has also volunteered at her church, John Muir Hospital and Contra Costa Libraries. Dedicated to exploring her Korean culture and language, Genie has taught elementary students at the Contra Costa Korean School, and says, "Teaching Korean to sprouting, young students taught me that languages had the endless power to bridge gaps between those who come from different areas of the world." She has become "an individual unafraid to show my heritage and encourage others to express theirs."

Korean and English aren't Genie's only languages. Her Campolindo high school German teacher wrote this about Genie: "Genie is fully engaged in the process of learning. In class, I can count on her to offer insightful comments and ask intelligent questions. Her interest is genuine, as it must be for one to achieve such a high level of proficiency."

JANUARY INTERBRANCH COUNCIL MEETING

The Interbranch Council (IBC) meets four to five times per year with the purpose of encouraging cooperation among Contra Costa County AAUW branches in order to serve the community and promote AAUW's mission. Representatives from each Contra Costa County branch and the Benicia-Vallejo Branch attend IBC meetings.

Items of interest reported and discussed at the January 28, 2020 IBC meeting are summarized below.

- OML was complimented for organizing an AAUW table at the January 18 Walnut Creek Women's March. Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek (DAW) and Benicia-Vallejo Branches joined OML at the table, which brought good visibility and publicity for AAUW branches.
- National AAUW guidance on branch records retention is that financial reports and minutes need to be kept forever so can prove non-profit status. One IBC member suggested storing records on CDs and noted that flash (thumb) drives have high failure rates.
- DAW branch recently met with Congressman DeSaulnier. They discussed two areas needing attention: the need for civic education in schools and how to identify fake news. He is open to collaborating with AAUW and recommended the book "They Don't Represent Us, Reclaiming Our Democracy" by Lawrence Lessig.
- DAW public policy chair proposed that IBC take on a civics in schools project, e.g., a project listed in www.edutopia.org, or form a special interests group to do so.
- Delta Contra Costa Branch reported they netted about \$12,000 in their holiday gift wrapping fundraisers at the Antioch Mall and Barnes & Noble store.
- Clayton Branch netted about \$2,000 at a fashion show fundraiser event at J Jill. Their March program will celebrate the Clayton library's 25th birthday; the Branch was instrumental in creating the library.
- Pleasant Hill-Martinez Branch has formed some new interest groups: hiking, medical/health care. They continue to run Study of Art and Music classes at Fair Oaks Elementary. Two of their fundraisers are a Soup Supper and "Painting With a Twist" (drink wine and paint).
- DAW reported that their Holiday Home Tour fundraiser for Tech Trek and local scholarships netted about \$18,000;

they plan to hold the event again this year. Their January program was a joint program with San Ramon Branch at which the League of Women Voters made a presentation on the petition to amend the November 2020 ballot measure regarding commercial property tax law to add a small business exemption.

- Concord Branch is moving their annual fundraiser from Mother's Day to Father's Day and partnering with a local car show group to remake the event into a wine/bar crawl with cars.
- San Ramon Branch's annual Tips for Change fundraiser for Tech Trek was at Gianni's Italian Bistro in San Ramon on February 10; the event included a raffle of wine and chocolate gift baskets. March program speaker is a professional organizer.
- Benicia-Vallejo Branch has sold about \$2,000 in tickets thus far for their annual March wine and cheese fundraiser, held at a member's house. Their January program was a candidates forum with the League of Women Voters.
- West Contra Costa Branch has a Global (issues) Interest Group. Upcoming branch programs include: local fire and EMT personnel presentation on emergency response (January), "Sisters in Crime" authors (women mystery writers, February), court appointed special advocates program for abused or neglected children (CASA, in March).



PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE



2018-19 Legislative Year Closes – Wins for 12 AAUW-Supported Bills

(From AAUW CA Perspective)

January 2019 brought a new Governor to California. While the previous Governor, Jerry Brown, was supportive of many of AAUW California priorities, it is expected that Governor Gavin Newsom has an even greater appreciation for our priorities and values. The CA legislature continues to have an interest in questioning the status quo and moving the needle on issues including the gender pay gap, sexual harassment, employment discrimination, Title IX, family leave, childcare, and education.

However, many issues were overshadowed by a few bills that seemed to take the oxygen out of the room and took up considerable time and attention. While unrelated, they still affected the AAUW California agenda because of the focus on them. There were major fights over legislation to limit medical exemptions for vaccines, regulation of internet privacy, and pharmaceutical price controls. Also notable was a significant battle over the codification of case law to clearly delineate which workers are employees versus independent contractors. With the 2018-19 legislative session finally at an end, members of the AAUW California Public Policy Committee, along with our Legislative Advocate Shannon Smith-Crowley, are proud to report that 12 of our AAUW-supported bills were signed into law. Some of our bills, including paid family leave and elimination of the sales tax on menstrual products and diapers, have been dealt with by the budget process, rendering the bills unnecessary. While AAUW scored significant wins, there were some losses that will require attention during the next legislative year.

Three of our bills became two-year bills that may be considered in the 2020 legislative year. These included two of our major bills. The first, SB 171, would have required payroll data to be broken down by gender, race, ethnicity, and job

category, and reported to state agencies. The reports would enable state agencies to identify patterns of wage disparities, allowing enforcement of California's equal pay laws. The second bill, SB 493, would have implemented a process for higher education institutions to prevent, respond and investigate sexual harassment claims. In addition to procedural protections, the bill would have required training of employees engaged in the grievance procedures on trauma-informed best practices and training on implicit bias. A third bill, AB 500, which would have provided maternity leave to California teachers and school employees, was passed, but then vetoed by the Governor.

AAUW's advocacy and policy research shaped California's 2019 legislation, but there is more work to be done around pay equity and maternity leave.

Equal Pay Day – Wear Red!

The next Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, March 31, 2020. This date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The National Committee on Pay Equity reminds us to wear red to symbolize how far women and minorities are “in the red” with their pay.

AAUW's updated publication *The Simple Truth* is based on the most recently released data from the US Census Bureau. In 2018 women received just 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man. Women of color often face a wider gap compared to white men. Black women make 62 cents on the dollar; and Latinas make 54 cents on the dollar. The pay gap has only decreased by a nickel in the 21st century.

AAUW FUND UPDATE

The Coca-Cola Foundation Renews Its Support for AAUW With \$500,000

The Coca-Cola Foundation has awarded a \$500,000 grant to the American Association of University Women (AAUW) to support its Women's Empowerment Program, which trains women in leadership and workplace negotiation skills as part of a multipronged effort to close the gender wage gap. More than 100,000 women are expected to benefit from the program in 2020.

This marks the second year in a row that The Coca-Cola Foundation has awarded a half million in funding to AAUW. Last year, the grant enabled the expansion of AAUW's training programs, including the development of an online version of the Work Smart salary negotiation course. This year, the focus will be on delivering the trainings to college and university students, as well as faculty, staff, and alumni networks, with a particular focus on historically black colleges and universities.


