WOMAN SUFFRAGE WARRIORS The American Women's Struggle for Voting Rights



Guest Speaker: Beverly Lane Local Historian

How did women gain the right to vote in California and the United States? Why did it take so long? Who were the woman suffrage warriors? Local historian Beverly Lane will provide a history of the American women's civil rights and the suffrage movement which

began in the 1800s. Her presentation will cover suffragists' campaigns to secure women's California and National rights to vote.

Beverly Lane has lived in Danville since 1973 and has been active in local government and civic organizations for decades. Beverly was the founding president of the Museum of the San Ramon Valley and is a curator and exhibit coordinator at the Museum. She is a past president of the Contra Costa County Historical Society and the Eugene O'Neill Foundation Tao House. Beverly is currently a Director of the East Bay Regional Park District (first elected in 1994) and is a past Danville Town Council member and three-time mayor of Danville.

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... PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Welcome to February – the month when our local scholarship, Tech Trek and STEM committees are all really active. And this month we focus on extraordinary women in history as a prelude to women's history month in March.

At our February general meeting we will learn about the U.S. women's suffrage movement and some courageous

and determined women who fought for women's right to vote. Our scholarship committee has worked with Orinda Books to hold a book fair *Celebrating Women Through Books* during February to raise money for local scholarships. Since this will likely be our only local scholarship fundraiser this year, we encourage everyone to spread the word about it and buy books in the Fair. Our STEM Committee continues with Girls4STEM webinars for high school girls, having held two webinars in January and two scheduled for February, and is finalizing preparations for our annual STEM Conference for middle school girls in March.

I'd be remiss to not mention our January general meeting where we were thrilled to have our local assemblywoman Ms. Rebecca Bauer-Kahan as our guest speaker. She had agreed to speak to our entire branch when some of our members met with her last year to discuss AAUW CA legislative priorities. That meeting was a requirement for our being awarded the Public Policy & Research star last year in AAUW's 5-Star National Recognition Program. A big thanks to Denise Burian for securing Assemblywoman Bauer-Kayan for our January general meeting and for being the Zoom webinar master, and to Laura Monin for introducing our guest speaker Ms. Bauer-Kahan and managing the Q&A portion of the meeting.

Per our request, Assemblywoman Rebecca Bauer-Kahan provided a legislative update focusing on legislation regarding equity for women. Her legislative update included her support of proposed legislation to create a "911" type number for mental health emergencies. She also noted that the State is trying to expedite COVID-19 vaccinations by working with Rite-Aid and Safeway to offer the vaccinations in their stores' pharmacies. Assemblywoman Bauer-Kahan closed her remarks by encouraging people to call her office if they need help with government services (she gave EDD unemployment payments as an example) or to suggest ideas for new legislation. If you missed the meeting, you can watch the video recording on our website.

With all the above, OML continues having mission-based programs and activities which support AAUW priorities and our branch vision to make a positive impact on our local and global community. And we continue to demonstrate that we truly are an AAUW 5-Star branch.

FOCUS ON ... A PROPOSED NEW BRANCH PRIORITY

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion ~ A Black Lives Matter Allies Group Update

A lot is happening with the AAUW-OML's BLM Allies Group, which has been meeting about six months now to learn and discuss how racism is pervasive in our social, political, justice systems and economic policy. We are studying what steps we can take to create awareness and affect change. AAUW-CA is now asking all branches to identify a branch Diversity, Equity and Inclusion chair position to develop, implement, and monitor programs and activities that promote diversity and inclusion at the AAUW branch level. Therefore, the BLM Allies Group is recommending next steps that our branch can take to support these efforts.

We are recommending board approval of the creation of a **Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Committee**, the chair for which would be appointed by our presidents. We also are proposing that Advancing Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion become a branch priority, not just a special interest group, especially since these are also AAUW-CA and National priorities. The DEI committee would continue to have a reading and discussion group for our members in order to gain a better understanding of diversity, equity and inclusion issues and policies, and also make available a list of up-to-date relevant materials for the entire membership and community. The DEI group would plan to sponsor a speaker for one of our general membership meetings, which is also open to the public.

The DEI Committee would partner with other community groups to encourage a more inclusive and diverse Lamorinda community. In fact, we are planning be co-signers of a letter, initiated by the Moraga Kiwanis and supported by other community organizations, that says we will stand up against hate, racism, and all forms of discrimination in our community. The DEI Committee will advocate for public policies that will result in progress towards increasing diversity, equity and inclusion in our schools and community.

JANUARY GENERAL MEETING ~ THE TAKE-AWAY ~



Assemblywoman **Rebecca Bauer-Kahan** was the speaker at our January 19 General Meeting. The planning committee had asked her to concentrate on her advocacy for Gender and Racial Equity. She gave a thorough and inspiring talk on her efforts as well as what is in the pipeline for upcoming

legislation impacting these issues as well as the environment and the Covid crisis.

Gender Equity As a member of the Select Committee on Reproductive Health she spoke of efforts to extend support for women in rural committees, communities of color, immigrant women and pregnant women in prison. As a member of the bi-partisan Women's Legislative Caucus, barriers to women's well being are being addressed such as more child care slots, attention to victims of sexual assault and domestic violence and trafficking. Bills were passed to eliminate taxes on menstrual products as well as diapers. She told of successful efforts to not cut education or MediCal.

Racial Equity Her priorities for the year are The Miles Hall Foundation working on the LifeLine Act (an alternative to 911 for person's experiencing a mental health crisis), which will prevent future police interventions such as resulted in the death of Miles Hall. A person would now be able to call 988 when witnessing someone having a mental health episode. Police reform measures also include AB 892, a bill that will examine the "use of deadly force" so that it is not used unless a police officer is in danger. Other racial equity efforts include antibias training for physicians, lawyers, judges, et.al as well as an ethnic studies course requirement for the California State University system. A similar requirement for high schools was passed but vetoed by Gov. Newsom.

Environment Clean Air and wildfire preservation bills are in the pipeline. Another priority is reforming the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) which has done a poor job of cleaning up hazardous waste.

She ended by offering her staff to assist us if we need help, including getting appointments for the COVID-19 vaccine.

SCHOLARSHIP NEWS

NCCWSL Saint Mary's Community Engagement Scholarship

The scholarship committee has approved the recommendation of committee chair, Mary Ann McLeod, to award two young women currently enrolled at Saint Mary's College \$1,000, in recognition for their commitment to community engagement.

Saint Mary's participates in a scholarship program for high school seniors who have demonstrated academic success and shown high potential for excelling in college. These students typically represent first generation, low-income families from underserved communities. While attending college they work in various positions at the college and in community outreach programs to help meet their financial needs. In this time of COVID-19, we are aware and recognize that their community engagement may have changed. Jobs that helped pay for books, tuition, etc., are not there presently, placing a grave hardship on these students.

The young women at Saint Mary's who had attended NCCWSL May 2019—Alondra Mendoza and Samantha Nieves—shared with us the challenges students are facing as they try to continue in their schooling given loss of jobs and a means for earning income to pay for some of their education. Working with Alondra and Samantha, we developed new criteria to award students from the high potential program in recognition of a student's effort to continue to do the work of advocating for traditional underrepresented groups in new and creative ways.

These awards validate the leadership roles and accomplishments of exceptional young women who maintain academic excellence and demonstrate a passion for community outreach. We awarded Samantha and Alondra the opportunity to attend NCCWSL 2019. They returned to Saint Mary's College taking on new leadership roles, while continuing to work with our branch to grow our partnership with the college. The feedback from these women was positive, they really appreciated the opportunity to experience such a dynamic and inspiring conference.

After approving the \$1000, we learned there would be a Virtual NCCWSL this year. Registration is \$95 per person. Given the quality of AAUW's past conferences, the committee has agreed to add the funds to register each recipient to participate in the Virtual NCCWSL. Working with Saint Mary's we are hoping there are other resources available to send more young women to the conference as we seek to break through educational and economic barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance.

UPDATES FROM AAUW NATIONAL

AAUW Statement on New White House Council on Gender Policy

Kim Churches has been meeting with principals (ED and CEOs) of the leading women's organizations to strategize and push for a White House Council – and it has happened!

AAUW is thrilled to learn that the Biden-Harris Administration has created a White House Gender Policy Council, a team charged with implementing "a government-wide focus on uplifting the rights of girls and women in the United States and around the world, restoring America as a champion for women and girls."

We are even more delighted that the council will be co-chaired by Jennifer Klein, chief strategy and policy officer at TIME'S UP, and Julissa Reynoso, the incoming assistant to the president and chief of staff to First Lady Dr. Jill Biden. Both women have broad and deep experience fighting for gender equity, and we know they have the wisdom, experience and right-minded approach to advance women's equity.

The task they face is formidable: The pandemic has been devastating for women of color and crushing for women in general. Despite making up the majority of the nation's essential workers, women have disproportionately suffered from our country's inadequate response to the COVID-19 crisis, losing more jobs and taking on family responsibilities that drove many out of the labor force. The road to recovery will be long, but with this council guiding the way in an intentional, coordinated fashion, we are confident we'll be swiftly traveling in the right direction.

Throughout its nearly 140-year history, AAUW has worked with our nation's leaders and policymakers to amplify women's voices and to advocate for the educational advancement and economic security for women and girls. We stand ready to work with the new administration's Gender Policy Council to ensure that racial and gender equity remain front and center as the new administration moves forward.

Change in Degree Requirement Up for a Vote

The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.

Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The Board feels very strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission, and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

Members can comment on the proposed amendment from January 11, 2021 through February 5, 2021 5 pm ET. Voting will open on April 7, 2021 and close May 17, 2021 5 pm ET.

2021 STEM VIRTUAL CONFERENCE




The STEM Conference will be held on Saturday, March 20, 2021, via Zoom. Registration will open on February 1 for up to 120 middle-school girls, about half of our normal conference attendance.

The day will begin at 9 am with a keynote speaker, **Franceska Hinkamp**, a Pediatric Geriatric Counselor. Her story on how she went from a BA in Sociology from USF to a new career in genetic counseling is very interesting. She received an MS degree in Human Genetics from Northwestern University. Today, she provides pioneering

genetic counseling in pediatrics, adult medical genetics, neonatal intensive care and pediatric cancer predisposition at the UCLA Institute for Precision Health in

Los Angeles. Franceska participated in Sister-to-Sister as a middle schooler in 2002 and again as a mentor in high school in 2008. She shares, "that day as a participant shifted the way I thought about my social identity as a young woman and my participation as a mentor was meaningful and helped to shape by leadership abilities." We are thrilled to have her back speaking to middle-school girls.

Following Franceska, each girl will participate in two of the 10 hands-on workshops being offered. Our presenters, most of whom have presented at our STEM conferences, figured out ways to create a virtual hands-on workshop.



Another workshop – *Seeing and Touching DNA*, the students will select three fruits or vegetables from which they will extract DNA, and will be provided with the materials to do the experiments.

In the *Wind Power and Speed* workshop, the girls will discuss how scientists use wind power and build an anemometer to measure the wind speed at their own houses.

Our popular *S'mores* workshop will have the girls explore data-driven experimental design for making something they are familiar with – s'mores. They will design an experiment in small groups (via Zoom rooms), and figure out the specified amount of microwave time to get the s'mores to various levels of "melt."

The conference will end at 11:30 am this year, because, well – how long can you be in Zoom meetings before you need a break?
