... PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Congratulations to AAUW on its 140th anniversary – making it one of the oldest feminist-based institutions in the U.S.! A celebratory virtual event is planned for November 17. Plans are to honor our history and to announce the 2021 AAUW Alumnae Recognition awardee. More information to come. AAUW is also hosting an anniversary webinar series featuring some of our most prestigious AAUW fellowship alumnae. The first webinar was held on October 27 with 1984-1985 American Fellow, Dr. Patricia Bell-Scott, a professor emerita of women’s studies at the University of Georgia and an award-winning author. Stay tuned for announcements of future webinars.

And welcome to Gloria Blackwell as the new CEO of AAUW! She has worked at AAUW for 17 years, including managing AAUW’s fellowships and grants program which has awarded more than \$70 million to women in the U.S. and overseas. She also was the driving force behind the salary negotiation trainings which have reached nearly 190,000 people.

Our branch is one of only eight in California that achieved 5-star status last year! Quite an accomplishment. Work this year on meeting the criteria for maintaining our 5-star rating continues. We have a Diversity Officer (Denise Burian) and have hosted a mission-based program with a diversity, equity and inclusion focus. We also have Public Policy Co-Chairs in place (Laura Monin and Connie Whitting). There is more work to do, but we are on our way to achieving 5-star status again this year.

The California Tech Trek program has a new program director – Karen Manilis. She is taking over from Susan Negrete and Alice Hill who were co-coordinators. Karen’s role is to lead and manage the program and interface with branch coordinators and camp directors as well as national and state leaders. The Tech Trek camp directors and treasurers met in mid-October to discuss the camps for the summer of 2022. There has not been an official “go/no go” on residential camps, but the expectation is that some residential programs will be back. Several Tech Trek campuses have still not said if they will support youth residential programs next summer, and Stanford is one of those. The camp director, Cynthia Miller, has put in a reservation for our camp, hoping that Stanford says yes and our camp is a “go”. There is also talk about whether or not to also offer the virtual camp again. Many campuses are now requiring COVID vaccinations for students and the expectation is that they will do so for youth programs. There is pressure from camp directors to have the TT application clearly state that vaccination is required for camp (just like for measles) with no exception for personal/religious beliefs.

**FOCUS ON ... AAUW'S NEW CEO**

The AAUW Board of Directors has selected **Gloria L. Blackwell** as the new Chief Executive Officer of AAUW, effective October 18, 2021.

Blackwell, who currently serves as AAUW's Executive Vice President and Chief Program Officer, was chosen for the role because of her deep executive experience and her impressive record of innovative contributions to AAUW's mission, according to AAUW Board President Julia T. Brown. "As AAUW proudly celebrates 140 years of advancing equity for women and girls this year, we know that Gloria is the right leader at the right time," Brown said. "Her outstanding talents are unparalleled assets to AAUW. The Board and all our members are privileged to partner with Gloria to continue to uplift our mission and vision of equity for all."

Blackwell, who is also AAUW's main representative to the United Nations, brings more than 30 years of nonprofit, international and government experiences to her new position. Among her many accomplishments is her 17-year management of AAUW's highly esteemed fellowships and grants program – awarding more than \$70 million in funding to women scholars and programs in the U.S. and overseas.

Blackwell has also been the driving force behind AAUW's signature programs, including its salary negotiation trainings, which have reached nearly 190,000 nationwide. She has initiated and built partnerships with major funders, including The Coca-Cola Foundation and Arconic Foundation. She has worked on pay equity initiatives with public officials in Washington D.C., New York City, Boston and Pittsburgh, as well as with numerous other state and municipal partners. She also worked with the National Science Foundation to increase girls' participation in the science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields.

At AAUW, Blackwell established the Alumnae Recognition Award to honor outstanding alumnae. She has represented the organization across the U.S and globally, including in Dubai, Morocco, Tunisia, Sao Paulo and Rio, Brazil. Most notably, Blackwell has significantly expanded the AAUW's outreach to girls and women of color. "I am incredibly honored and grateful to the Board for valuing my commitment to global gender equity, my leadership at AAUW and the contributions of my high-performing teams," said Blackwell, who is the second woman of color to lead AAUW in its 140-year history. "I stand in a unique place, and I plan to use my skills and expertise to build a new and stronger vision for AAUW. I vow to grow our impact across all communities and expand our commitment to infuse equity and inclusion in everything we do."

Blackwell is the recipient of multiple honors and awards and has led and served on numerous boards and advisory groups, including the UNA-USA Council of Organizations Executive Committee, the International Book Bank, Latina SciGirls and the Canadian Organization for Development Through Education (CODE). She holds a master's degree in education and human development from The George Washington University, and a bachelor's degree in foreign service from the Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. A fluent French speaker, she also studied at the American University in Paris, France.

## Updates From AAUW California Public Policy Committee

**Your Voice Is Critically Needed  
TODAY.**

To recover from the pandemic, AAUW demands Congress enact basic supports – a permanent paid leave program, child care funding and the Child Tax Credit. But as they contemplate the final version of the Build Back Better Act, paid leave is at serious risk of being cut. This is unacceptable.

**This is where you come in.**

We need you to take action now. Members of Congress must hear from their constituents repeatedly. Keep contacting them every day until victory. AAUW's Crisis Recovery Tool Kit outlines critical ways you can do your part to fight for women and the economic needs of families:

**Abortion Justice**

Although the constitutionally-guaranteed right to an abortion has been systematically under attack for decades, it is currently in danger of disappearing altogether. As AAUW National recently noted, "Every person should have the ability to make their own informed decisions regarding their reproductive life. It is beyond time for abortion to be secured legally, funded fully, and equitably available for all who need it, when they need it, without shame or stigma." With the recent refusal of the U.S. Supreme Court to intervene in the onerous Texas case, it is clear that we can no longer count on the courts to protect this critical right. Congress must pass the Women's Health Protection Act. Watch for Action Alerts from National, use them to keep pressure on your representatives, and sign-up now for the 2-Minute Activist if you haven't already done so by clicking here:

**Legislative Updates**

Four of our priority bills have been enrolled (passed by the Legislature) and are awaiting the Governor's signature:

- **SB 62** – requires fair pay, instead of "by the piece" payment, for garment workers;
- **AB 367** – requires free menstrual products be provided in girls/women's bathrooms in schools;
- **AB 123** – increases paid family leave benefits to 65 – 75 percent of regular pay; and
- **AB 1074** – requires hotel and janitorial workers who have lost their jobs due the pandemic to be prioritized for hiring as businesses reopen.

**Economic Equity**

October 21 was Latina Equal Pay Day – the day Latina women, who are paid just 57 cents to every white male's dollar, finally catch up from the previous year. To help raise awareness, our coalition partner Stronger California hosted a Latina Equal Pay Day & Essential Women Workers Virtual Summit. As part of the nation's largest ethnic or racial minority, Hispanic or Latino people are an increasingly influential constituency in the United States. Already accounting for 17 percent of the U.S. population, they are expected to make up nearly one-third of the country by 2060 – an increasingly powerful and fast-growing voting bloc.



It will take concerted effort to close the gap—but we can do it. We need to expand educational opportunities and address biases and inequities within the education system; advance equal pay laws and practices, including the federal Paycheck Fairness Act, laws in states and employer practices; and expand how we recruit and train for jobs and promotion pathways.

### YOUNG WOMEN WITH VISION Celebrating Our 2021 Scholarship Winners



**Chaya Tong** is a writer and an activist. As a Miramonte sophomore, she co-founded the Writer's Mag (Creative Writing Club and Literary Magazine) with a friend. During the fall semester they led creative writing workshops and hosted guest speakers. In the spring, they published a literary magazine. During the pandemic Chaya also volunteered with Friendly Flash Fiction to teach creative writing in a fun environment to an eight-year-old student via Zoom.

Chaya co-founded the South Asian Culture Club to educate the community on Indian culture and support students of color. In her senior year she was selected by the principal to serve as Miramonte's student representative to the School District Governing Board. She became a vocal representative of her student body as she called on the board to rescind the new inter district transfer policy which limited students from outside the school district. She noted a large decline in interest in classes named "Deconstructing Race" and "Ethnic Studies." She was able to report to the Board tangible facts that the new transfer policy had reduced the number of students enrolled in equity classes. The board voted unanimously to reopen school borders.

Chaya states: "Serving on the school board taught me how to work with others toward a common goal and how to use creativity and logic to persuade. It also taught me that real change can come in the smallest ways. It can come from big actions like changes in legislation, but it can also come from something as tiny as overturning one rule in one school district."


