**FOCUS ON ... DIVERSITY, EQUITY and INCLUSION  
and MORE ABOUT BERNARD COLEMAN III**

As an experienced spokesperson, television personality, thought leader and influencer, **Bernard Coleman** has moderated panels, been featured on panels, facilitated workshops, and presented keynote speeches. You name it; he’s done it and brings refreshing candor to his public speaking style.



He also led *Hillary for America’s* (HFA) Diversity and Human Resources initiatives, as the first ever Chief Diversity and Human Resources Officer in United States history, for any presidential campaign of either political party. In this role, Bernard helped drive the campaign’s institutional planning in support of the mission and goals as well as assessing the strategic diversity indicators and standards that ensure responsibility and accountability for

achieving diversity, multiculturalism, and cultural competence within the diversity and inclusion matrix.

Bernard Coleman is Chief Diversity and Engagement Officer at **Gusto**, an all-in-one Human Resources platform that provides an HR application for businesses. He leads Employee Engagement efforts, which encompasses the diversity, equity and inclusion, employee relations and people integrity/governance/compliance functions. In this role, he drives the systemic and holistic diversity and belonging programs throughout Gusto and his efforts span the boundaries of this company working in close collaboration with people program areas like human resources, talent recruitment, analytics, marketing, communications, and branding in an effort to enhance belonging and diversity.

Here are some of his thoughts on leadership, taken from a recent talk on diversity in the workplace: Have you ever image-searched the word “leader?” If you have, you’ve probably noticed most of the images show pictures of men walking up a mountain, leading a group of other men, or a man standing slightly bigger than everyone else. The image results seldom show women, people of color or other underrepresented people. Apparently, a leadership prerequisite is being a man.

So it begs the question, just what is a leader? As defined, a leader is a person who guides or directs a group, has the ability to lead or undertakes an act or instance of leading. Synonyms commonly associated with leadership often include authoritativeness, influence, command and effectiveness, as well as sway and clout.

By definition, leadership seems fairly clear, but Coleman would argue that leadership is often in the eye of the beholder, and different types of leaders emerge based on what the environment calls for. There is a real cost to organizations that cannot see leadership potential in all of its shapes and sizes. Companies lose out on innovation, which creates a talent and innovation deficit. If we are to truly harness the pool of talent, we need to lay bare the leadership traits that often go unnoticed, particularly when it’s not presented in the prototypical archetype.

## PUBLIC POLICY

### Title IX



Next year will mark 50 years since the passage of Title IX, a landmark civil rights law prohibiting sex discrimination by ensuring women and girls have access to equitable education free from discrimination and harassment.

AAUW was not only instrumental to the creation and passage of Title IX in 1972, but we remain fierce advocates for it today. Examples of our recent involvement are as follows:

- Fund remarkable women like Rachael Rollins, the first woman district attorney in Boston. After Rollins fought to get her lacrosse team reinstated under Title IX as a college athlete, she used her AAUW Fellowship to research Title IX in New England.
- Push back against new rules that would make it harder for students to come forward about sexual harassment or assault and get the support they need under Title IX.
- Advocate for the Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA), which would provide educational entities and Title IX coordinators the resources, training and technical assistance necessary to ensure equity in education.

This year made painfully clear—we can never trust that any law is “settled.” By constant vigilance we are learning ways to make legislation stronger and more effective so that progress can be protected.

### Women’s Reproductive Rights – Where Are We Now? by Claire Noonan, AAUW CA Public Policy

By January 22, 2022, the 49th anniversary of the Roe v Wade decision, SCOTUS (the Supreme Court of the United States) will have heard arguments on Texas SB 8 legislation banning pregnancy termination after six weeks and Mississippi’s legislation (Dobbs vs. Jackson Women’s Health Organization) to ban abortion after 15 weeks.

What are the issues? For Texas, it isn’t about the constitutionality of the legislation, i.e. the fundamental right decided by Roe v Wade. Instead, a decision will be made on the tactics used by the Texas legislature – delegating their enforcement duties to citizens – to preclude lawsuits against the State.

The decision on the Mississippi legislation will be straightforward. One, SCOTUS could overturn Roe v Wade. Two, the court could limit legal standing to challenges on state law, e.g. doctors wouldn’t be able to challenge on behalf of patients. Three, new legal standards for the evaluation of abortion regulations may be created so states aren’t required to show that the benefits of an abortion ban outweigh the undue burden to patients – reversing Planned Parenthood v Casey. (Women’s Health Policy, 11/21/2021)

One hundred six state laws have been passed to restrict abortion in 2021. Activists, like AAUW, are bringing lawsuits before the Supreme Court. AAUW has submitted an amicus brief for Dobbs vs. Jackson Women’s Health Organization as to the constitutionality of the Mississippi law.

In addition, the ACLU and others have brought lawsuits against other Mississippi abortion-related legislation like regulations for informed consent, a waiting period before the procedure, and a ban on telemedicine visits.

Surveys show that 60-70 percent of Americans approve of abortion in all or most circumstances. Only 20 percent think abortion should be illegal in all circumstances. (New York Times, Upshot (5/19/2021). AAUW and AAUW California stand with the majority, and the time to act is now. We must pressure the Senate to pass the Women’s Health Protection Act. The legislation must become law in this session. Unfair changes in representation have occurred with redistricting. Votes in the 2022 midterm elections that would elect representatives who would vote for this bill could be suppressed.

Celebrating Our 2021 Scholarship Winners • Campolindo High School

Helen has a passion for STEM. She attended Tech Trek and attended our STEM Conference as a middle school student. As a freshman at Campolindo her leadership skills became evident as she participated in our branch STEM Conference at Saint Mary’s and, in her senior year, the Girls4

STEM webinar. Throughout her four years of high school Helen helped plan the conference and organized the attendance procedure. Helen recruited middle school girls, trained youth and adult volunteers, plus supervised workshops. Helen was instrumental in designing the Girls4STEM program. She brainstormed possible speakers and interviewed presenters. She attended practice presentation to give the presenters feedback making them relevant to middle school girls.

“There is a blatant need for more girls to pursue STEM. For us to build an equitable world, we must be equal partners. Inequality and mental health are global issues, affecting the careers of women everywhere.”

Helen also encouraged dialogue about mental health. She volunteered at In Touch, a student led, nonprofit that seeks to promote mental health among teens. She designed and distributed a mental health curriculum and posted blogs on mindfulness and wellness.

Helen also volunteered for the Lafayette-Moraga Youth Organization and was co-president of the Children’s Skin Disease Foundation. Her other interests include beekeeping and photography.



**Jacqueline Artiaga**

Jacqueline stepped up and began volunteering through Charity League in the seventh grade. Her time volunteering at the Bay Area Rescue Mission allowed her to learn more about herself and strengthened her desire to give back.

“The more I was volunteering, the better I understood the privileges I have been granted. . . . It taught me that people who may fall on dark, difficult times can persevere and find a better life if provided some support and a nutritious meal.”

As a result of her early volunteer efforts, and then as a Campolindo student, Jacqueline became the voice of equity and cultural change. As a member of the Black Student Union and the Equity Team she coordinated campus diversity clubs and cultural events. As Co-Commissioner of Diversity she advocated for diversifying district curriculum resulting in the successful introduction of authors of color into the English curriculum. In addition, she led district-wide diversity efforts and represented Campolindo to the governing district. She spoke at governing board meetings and parent club meetings.

Jacqueline also volunteered at the Lawrence Hall of Science and Nation-State of Play Podcast. The latter involved assembling raw audio to ensure cogent interviews and question politicians, CEOs, and advisors about their involvement in California’s government.

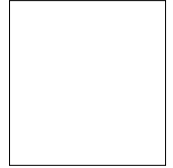
