... PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Our mission: To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy.

The presentation by Bernard Coleman at our January meeting by Zoom was engaging and informative. He spoke about how his company, Gusto, provides a human resource application for

businesses and works to create more diverse, equitable and inclusive workplaces. I appreciated his summary of the life-cycle of an employee, from being recruited to being on-boarded, learning/development, recognition and rewards, job performance to retention or exiting. Certainly reminded me of the progression of people I hired as well as my own working career. When asked about his personal experience, he said that he, his wife and his children were happy to live in Orinda.

Last year the 140th anniversary of AAUW was a very productive one. Some successes include 188,000 women who trained to negotiate their salaries and benefits, two-minute activists sent 68,271 letters to elected officials, and \$5 million awarded to 260 fellows and grantees.

Four new research reports on women's issues were published. You can find them at https://www.aauw.org/research/#reports:

Systemic Racism and the Pay Gap, outlines how the wage gap is the result of centuries of intentional structural economic inequalities, exploitation, segregation and implicit bias.

Factory Flaw: The Attrition and Retention of Women in Manufacturing, explores the dearth of women in well-paying jobs in manufacturing and outlines ways employers and policymakers can recruit, retain and advance women in this field. The Power Gap Among Top Earners at America's Elite Universities, examines women's leadership among the country's 130 research universities. It reveals that few women are among the highest paid professionals at each school.

Pandemic Inequity: Latinas and the COVID-19 Experience, part of AAUW's Latina Policy Initiative, assesses the economic and health impact of COVID-19 on Latinas, particularly those who are essential workers and in low-wage occupations.

Tech Trek Update: We do not yet have confirmation from Stanford about camps for next summer. Apparently, they have not made any decision about youth residential camps. All the paperwork asking for the weeks of July 3 and 10 for Camp Hopper and Camp Curie has been submitted and we are waiting to hear.

AAUW California has made the decision that the Tech Trek program also will include a state-wide virtual camp option with a standardized curriculum. In 2022, the traditional program will be dependent on campus availability and, of course, the state of the pandemic. The curriculum of the virtual camp is still being developed and they will be looking for volunteers to help deliver a quality experience.

Report of 501c4 and 501c3 minutes

Welcoming the New Year, Jan Cushman called the board meeting to order. Marielle Boortz reported that the Holiday Wine and Cheese event added \$1,198 to our treasury. After Peggy Cabaniss contributed \$2 to even up the sums, Denise Burian moved that \$300 be each given to Tech Trek, Scholarship, STEM Conference and Burckhalter.

Burckhalter, although library furniture is in place, is not welcoming OML yet and Tech Trek is having difficulty finding universities that will host the summer camps. OML is looking forward to an outstanding speaker Bernard Coleman for our January 18 meeting on ZOOM. We will reach out to other branches and local groups to partake in Mr. Coleman's presentation.

Senator Steven Glazer, at our February membership Zoom meeting, will report from Sacramento about legislation that is in line with our AAUW priorities.

March, an international program, will feature a Lamorinda resident who has traveled the world and is now part of the East Bay. We hope to meet in person.

Scholarship's Book Fair, in collaboration with Orinda Books, takes place for the whole month of February. All the featured books are listed in our OML website.

AAUW SUPPORTS THE BUILD BACK BETTER BILL

The Build Back Better Bill (H.R. 5376) has passed the House and is now in the Senate. This bill has three provisions that are critical to our mission:

- Universal paid family and medical leave up to 12 weeks,
- An extension of the child tax credit through 2022, and
- Affordable childcare.

The expanded **Child Tax Credit** expired in December after Congress failed to extend it. That means the families of more than 23 million children are again experiencing economic instability in the new year. Americans also continue to be forced to choose between their lives and their livelihoods because they lack access to paid leave and affordable child care. It is inexcusable that the Senate has not yet voted on the Build Back Better Act.

The final version of the Build Back Better Act will be smaller than the nearly \$2 trillion legislation that passed in the House last year, a massive bill that addressed health care, childcare, education, and climate while overhauling the nation's tax policy. Senator Tim Kaine told The New Republic on Thursday that Congress needs to focus on "the core of what's most important," citing provisions on universal pre-kindergarten and affordable childcare. "They're the noncontroversial ones. Those have not been the ones that have been holding anybody up." But if the provisions Kaine mentioned are not controversial, one issue related to childcare is: the child tax credit. Biden acknowledged that the measure, which lifted 3.7 million children out of poverty in December and cut child poverty rates by nearly 30 percent, might fall out of the final bill.

Here are ways you can help get this important legislation through the Senate: If you have friends or family in Arizona or West Virginia, urge them to put pressure on their senators to vote "yes."

- Marking the first anniversary of the January 6 insurrection, AAUW joined more than 40 gender equity organizations and leaders in a statement pledging to fight for our democracy. In the face of bigotry, disinformation and anti-democratic violence, urge your members of Congress to support the Voting Rights Advancement Act and the Freedom to Vote Act today!
- In December, members of the policy team hosted the first in a series of webinars, "Exploring Tough Policy Issues Through an AAUW Lens: Political and Non Partisan." Watch the recording to learn about highlights of our proud non-partisan, yet very political, history.
- On December 22, President Biden announced an extension of the federal student-loan freeze through May 1, 2022. AAUW has advocated for student-loan relief before and during the pandemic, and we won't stop until the government delivers.
- As we begin the 2022 midterm election year, the Center for American Women in Politics shared an assessment of 2021 state elections and how some data may foreshadow gender trends.
- Stay engaged this year with our Two-Minute Activist tool! You can also check out our letters, comments, testimony and legal briefs to learn more about AAUW's positions and advocacy efforts.



Elected to the California State Senate in a special election in 2015, **Senator Steve Glazer** won re-election to a full four-year term in 2016 and again in 2020.

Representing Senate District 7 based in Contra Costa and Alameda counties. he has consistently voted to support women's issues and has a 100 percent lifetime record of voting with Planned Parenthood. Education is a top priority for Senator Glazer, who has voted to provide higher education opportunities for more students by opening up thousands of new slots at the University of California and the California State University systems. He also has consistently supported the needs of the vulnerable, voting to raise the minimum wage and to ensure financial support to infants born while their families are receiving CalWORKs grants.

DEI UPDATE

DEI & White House Gender Policy Council.

I sometimes attend webinars presented by the White House Public Engagement Office. At a recent webinar, we heard from a staff member of the White House Gender Policy Council, established by President Biden in March, 2021 to advance gender equity and equality in both foreign and domestic policy development and implementation.

Sound familiar? AAUW Advancing Equity for Women and Girls! The Gender Policy Council is an official Council, with similar status as the White House Council of Economic Advisors, Office of Science and Technology Policy, Office of the US Trade Policy and others. This office developed a national strategy for gender equity and equality. This strategy includes increased access to healthcare, child care access, child tax credits and gender equity based policy throughout the government. And indeed we do see the focus on those issues in the budget and legislation the Biden administration has or is trying to get passed. They recently sponsored the first White House "Maternal Day of Action" focusing on maternal health issues, especially black maternal health outcomes, which lags outcomes of other groups.

I was very encouraged by the focus of so many staff in the White House responsible for developing policy, strategies, and legislation to advance equity.
