Virtual Tech Trek Camps Are a Success!

The girls who attended one of two virtual Tech Trek camps had a blast designing "wearable tech," complete with learning engineering design principals and how to program LED lights and servos to move an object. They individualized their creations with items representing their interests, strengths and values. They also included a representation of a "STEMinista," a successful woman in STEM. After lunch, there were inspirational talks by women working in a variety of STEM fields followed by two hands-on workshops each day:

- Exploring Water at Its Surface surface tension experiments including a couple with shaving cream
- *Strawberries Have DNA?* lecture on DNA and extracting DNA from strawberries and each girl's spit
- *Lights, Waves, and Plasma, Oh My!* lecture and building a spectroscope using a kit with a diffraction grating
- *Magnifying the Miniscule* building a microscope from a paper kit, a lens and magnets
- *Blowing in the Wind* lecture and building a windmill to do the work of lifting pennies
- *Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star, Power=12* lecture on constellations and building a constellation with copper tape, LED lights and a battery
- *The Magic of Paper* making a paper cube from 12 origami bowties
- Math Is on the Menu making pizza dough for a pizza for four and calculating how to convert the recipe to feed 8 or 100 people, making conversions of volume and weight measurements.

Evenings were spent with optional presentations, including a tour of a Tokamac device being developed to produce thermonuclear fusion power.

Sheila Apte volunteered as an afternoon coach for all eight of the workshops. In addition, former Tech Trekkers Camille Bradley, Michelle Shen, Giorgia Stankus, Emma Wong and Jada Hembrador volunteered as coaches and Emilia Gutman led the *Blowing in the Wind* workshop. Great support for the camps from our branch!

Overall, more than 100 volunteers ultimately delivered over 3,500 hours of volunteer coaching and mentoring in the two 41-46 hour camps with 178 campers! Thanks again to Dr. Mary Isaac of San Diego for acting as the camp director and organizing the camp for the second time!!

SEPTEMBER 20 PROGRAM Sponsored by D.E.I.



Advancing Equity in Justice in Contra Costa County

This is the topic to be presented by Chief Assistant Public Defender for Contra Costa Public Defenders (CCPD), **Brandon Banks**. Barbara Bell (Programs Chair) and I met with him recently to discuss his presentation to our general meeting on Tuesday, September 20.

While we will be showcasing what our branch does to advance equity for women in our communities, Brandon Banks will be showcasing what CCPD does to advance equity in our criminal justice system. He said there is currently an evolution in public defender's offices away from a traditional restricted role of public defense to an expanded more wholistic approach to serving clients who are in the criminal justice system and in need of defense and support. There is an intersection of social, economic, education, and economic justice issues that impact the clients in the criminal justice system. The emerging wholistic approach addresses the client as a whole to address root causes of why a client is in the criminal justice system, provide the representation they need in the legal system, and to consider other needs that help them successfully transition back into the community. CCPD is developing a data driven approach to services and resources, and how they can have a positive effect on the community they serve directly and the wider community as well.

The DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) committee is sponsoring this speaker to educate us on on what CCPD does, and after meeting with Brandon Banks, we are very excited to hear about their work. They are keenly aware of the goal of advancing equity in justice and how the changes they are making will move the arc of justice forward. Please come to the September Showcase to learn about their new vision for public defense in Contra Costa County.

Brandon Banks began his career with the Contra Costa Public Defenders in 2002. Mr. Banks was raised in Richmond, California, and graduated from Santa Clara University School of Law in 2002. During his time as an attorney with the CCPD, Mr. Banks has represented clients in cases ranging from misdemeanors to serious felonies. He has tried over seventy-five jury trials, including multiple homicide cases. Before becoming the Chief Assistant Public Defender, Mr. Banks supervised the Arraignment unit, the Clean Slate unit, and the Probation and Parole Supervision unit. He was also previously the lead attorney in the Clean Slate unit, where he worked to enhance the Contra Costa Public Defender's engagement with the local community and partner agencies to expand post-conviction relief to the locally impacted population. Mr. Banks has worked with local community advocates to convince the county board of supervisors to impose a mortarium of the locally imposed criminal fees. At the state level, he worked with a coalition of criminal court reform advocates to get criminal fee elimination legislation passed.

ERA UPDATE



- The required 38 states have already ratified the ERA.
- The US House of Representatives has voted to remove the time limit from the preamble of the ERA.
- It has also introduced H. Resolution 891 with 179 co-sponsors to declare ratification of the ERA valid and that it is the 28th Amendment to the US Constitution.

Only ONE barrier remains.

We must now win the US Senate approval of the House Resolution to remove the time limit, declare the ERA ratification valid and enshrine the ERA in the Constitution. Given the reversal of Roe v. Wade, the ERA is needed more than ever.

OML Public Policy will be working to get out the vote in November and will host the League of Women voters in October for their insights on our ballots. Your participation would be wonderful.

However to add comment, OML Ad Team was successful each of these two years in maintaining the support of valued advertisers and generating over 50 percent of the previous annual ad income. This was accomplished in spite of several business closures.

Just ask your key business contacts if they will help support the work of our AAUW-OML branch. Or, please accompany a team member to help make the connection. Through their ad support, they can partner with us, to continue the important work we do with and for local women and girls.

The OML Branch of AAUW has accomplished this by:

- sending 1000+ girls to Tech Trek science and math camps since 1998,
- creating and annually staffing a STEM Conference for middle-school girls,
- keeping the library at Burckhalter Elementary in East Oakland open since the 1990s.
- providing college scholarships to area high school seniors for over 35 years and
- sending SMC college students to a national leadership conference that teaches women how to negotiate starting salaries in their early professional careers.

Although the Ad Team rarely meets, each of us individually maintains a structured working relationship with our key accounts. One OML member finding one new advertiser would be a significant contribution to the work of this branch through the ad accounts we serve. If fifteen of our members could get just ONE business they already support to run a business card size ad for \$150/year, we could gain back recently decreased revenue. Each ad, large or small, would add to "success ahead."
