#### **Celebrating Our Branch**

We look forward to seeing all of you on Sunday, December 11, from 5-8 pm at our **Holiday Fundraiser** at the Moraga Art Gallery in the Rheem Shopping Center. We want to celebrate not only the holiday season but also celebrate the many wonderful projects that our branch supports throughout the year.

Just think of the impact that these Community Outreach projects have had over the years on young women and girls:

- Burckhalter Library Project: Budget \$3,000. For 30 years, AAUW-OML has been stimulating the minds and inspiring a love of reading and learning in hundreds of young students in an underserved Oakland community.
- Scholarship Project: Budget \$6,850. Our branch has awarded scholarships for community service and academic excellence to young graduating women from our high schools and Saint Mary's College.
- Tech Trek: Budget \$7,435. AAUW-California is celebrating 25 years as sponsors for this weeklong teacher referred program for girls, designed to stimulate interest in science, technology, engineering and math. Our branch has sent young women every year to Tech Trek. Over 120 raising eighth grade girls have benefited from our sponsorship.
- AAUW-OML STEM Project: Budget \$16,800. STEM and AAUW-OML was designed and developed by our members to encourage the interest of middle school girls in science, technology, engineering and math, and is held on the campus of Saint Mary's College. Over 900 curious girls have chosen to participate in this AAUW-OML conference.
- Diversity Equity and Inclusion Program (DEI): \$300. A developing project seeks to educate, advocate, and discuss the meaning of diversity, equity and inclusion within us, our branch and our community

All these projects take time and money. We reviewed the financial needs of these projects at our last board meeting and were overwhelmed with the estimated total funds needed to meet the annual budgets for these efforts:

Burckhalter - \$3,000 Scholarship - \$6,850 Tech Trek - \$7,425 STEM Conference - \$16,800 DEI - \$300

Total Revenue needed to accomplish all projects for the year: \$34,375

We appreciate your financial support throughout the year to ensure the success of our Community Outreach Projects. It is important that as a branch we all work together and support an overall branch fundraiser that will benefit all our projects. Please join us for a very special holiday event on December 11 and help continue the benefits our branch offers to young women and girls in our community.

OML welcomes **Dr. Amy Chu**, our newest branch member. She joins the STEM committee and, along with Dean Wensley from Saint Mary's College, will be one of our faculty representatives. **WELCOME**, **AMY!** 

Dr. Amy Chu is an Assistant

Professor of Chemistry and an Inorganic Chemist specializing in organometallic syntheses and catalysis. She is particularly passionate about research topics that address the climate challenges of current industrial processes. She leads a team of undergraduate researchers that tackle these challenges by implementing the principles of green chemistry and systems thinking in the design of new synthetic methodologies. Her work is currently supported by the American Chemical Society Petroleum Research Fund.

Dr. Chu has a BS in Chemistry from the National Taiwan University (2011). She worked with Prof. Thomas B. Rauchfuss as a graduate student and obtained a PhD in Chemistry from the Univ. of Illinois in Urbana Champaign (2016). She conducted post-doctoral research with Prof. Karen I. Goldberg at the Univ. of Washington and Univ. of Pennsylvania. From 2020 to 2022, she was an Assistant Professor of Chemistry at Mills College in Oakland CA. After the closure of Mills College in June 2022, she joined the Chemistry faculty at Saint Mary's College of California as an Assistant Professor.

In addition to her role at Saint Mary's College, Dr. Chu is a researcher at the Kleinman Center for Energy Policy where she implements her expertise to formulate policy proposals that empower the climate-friendly transformation of the energy sector.

I have been interested in STEM since I was in preschool and wanted to be a veterinarian and an astronaut and also loved to visit museums centered on STEM. Since then I have been able to look deeper into this through veterinary science projects in 4-H which has greatly

grown my love for biology as a whole as well as specifically animal sciences.

After attending AAUW's virtual Tech Trek in 2021 my interest in technology and math has also grown which has broadened my views by leading me to fields that are made up of a combination of my interests such as biotechnology that I previously did not know of. This past summer the opportunity of being a junior build coach for Virtual Tech Trek surpassed my expectations for I learned a new side and viewpoint on coding through helping campers code LEDs and servo motors with Arduino. This allowed for me to be confident in a side of STEM that I previously had little knowledge on in turn giving me greater confidence to pursue not only my previous interests in STEM but also allow myself to explore and look into other sides as potential fields of interest. 


In 7th grade, I earned the opportunity to attend Tech Trek. Through attending

Maristela wrote a story for the Blueprint detailing the Lafayette fires in 2019 and won several prizes for her article. As Editor-in-Chief she spearheaded new projects and led the coverage of the pandemic and the community's response to Black Lives Matter protests.

As a member of the Young People's Symphony Orchestra viola section and assistant principal, Maristella

guided rehearsals and organized practice Zoom meetings. She was invited to participate in a charity benefit concert at Davis Symphony Hall. Maristella found comfort is music.

She participated in the Saint Mary's Church Teen band for five years. The band became her second home, offering new friendships and new musical choices. As a singer and pianist for the youth band Maristella organized and performed during church services, funerals, Quinceaneras and community concerts.

Maristella is keenly aware of the value of community service for herself and those she assisted. She said, "Through the teen band, I met grievers who wanted the band to perform at a loved one's funeral, proud fathers who wanted me to play piano at their daughters' Quinceaneras and worshippers who had nowhere to stay for the night. While volunteering at church initially saved me, it became how I connected to different communities and helped others grow."

#### AAUW California's New Statewide Program GOV TREK



The Gov Trek Program is a new virtual program for high school junior and senior girls designed to encourage the next generation to pursue careers in pub-

lic service. The program is designed, administered, and delivered by AAUW California at no cost to students or branches.

Over five two-hour Saturday sessions covering two months that begin on January 28, 2023, students will engage in interactive and inspiring activities with exposure to women legislators, career options, and the inner workings of a political campaign. The program will culminate in a group competition to create a realistic campaign simulation.
