We All Have a Story to Tell. How Will You Tell Yours?

AAUW-OML member **Sandy Fox-Sohner** has had a burning story to tell ever since she taught high school algebra and geometry. It is a true story about a famous 19th century self-taught mathematician, **Sonia Kovalevsky**, the first female professor in Europe and Russia.

In the 1800s, women were not allowed in universities because they were considered incapable of abstract thought. Determined to change this, Sonia set out to open the door for women to obtain an education by proving women are just as intelligent as men. Sandy believes this uplifting story has a lot to tell us about perseverance, struggle, and the possibility of change.

Sandy wrote a screenplay based on the life of Sonia Kovalevsky that has won several awards at film festivals. Working with a director and a co-producer, she now seeks a major producer to make the film.

What is your story and how will you tell it? Sandy will share her journey of learning how to write a screenplay and how to connect with other screen writers, editors, and representatives. She learned how independent films get made, as well as how to engage a director, co-producer, or investor; how to attract a major producer; and, most importantly, how things are changing for women filmmakers.

for all the wonderful programs that are available through our general meetings, our special interest groups, and our community projects.

Grateful for all returning members but especially grateful for the new members who have joined our branch and are already participating in projects and committees. Grateful for our board members who work so hard behind the scenes to accomplish so much, to engage so many members, to offer such a variety of activities.

Grateful for the huge success of our first annual branch Holiday Fundraiser which raised almost \$12,000 (net of expenses). This event brought us together as a branch to focus on all the projects we sponsor and our alignment with AAUW mission. Grateful for the generous donations of members to either the Undesignated Fund or to the individual Community Outreach (CO)Projects for a total of \$11,400.

Grateful for the grants we have received from outside organizations plus the net proceeds from fundraisers held by individual CO projects for a total of almost \$8,000.

Grateful that total donations to our Community Outreach Fund (our 501©3 organization) from July 1, 2022 through January 22, 2023, are over \$31,000. Our projects have sufficient reserves to pay for all upcoming expenses for the rest of the year. We look forward to many exciting events in the coming months as we select and honor five young women for scholarships, select and award six young women to attend a week long Tech Trek camp at Sonoma State, put on a day long conference for 180-200 middle school girls at Saint Mary's College.

ONE WEEK at BURCKHALTER

Grades K, 1st, 2nd, 3rd and Special Ed heard the California Young Reader book "We Don't Eat our Classmates" a story about a T. Rex who has trouble making friends with the children in his class because he finds them delicious and can't resist his desire to eat them. As a prereading activity, students were asked what we don't do in the library. Students said don't talk, don't run, etc. Lots of laughs when the title was shown to them. Next week the book is "Parker Looks Up: An Extraordinary Moment" about a young girl seeing the portrait of Michelle Obama in the National Gallery. Biography books



about Ms. Obama will be displayed for further reading.

Students received a pencil prize for remembering to return the books and some classes got pencils for good library behavior. Volunteers brainstormed how to help the Kindergarteners learn library behavior. Tables were moved to manage the space better. We are looking to solve the problem of them switching books or putting books back on the shelves after they are checked out to them.

The 4th and 5th grade classes were introduced to the passport program we will be doing with the upper grades. We showed a short video about the continents. The video was very popular with its fun song. The passport sticker this week was Mexico. Students were shown Mexico on a map and a few facts given. Also taught were geography terms city, state, country and continent. Only a few students knew the name of their city, state, etc. Good introduction to geography. Next week we will use the individual laminated maps donated by AAUW member, Mary Leigh Miller and teach more geography. It was a terrific opportunity to show off our library program to the principal. She was a substitute teacher for the 5th graders. On the way out the door she said, "this is important information to know city, state, country and continents." Yeah, for AAUW's community outreach program!

More work was done on the major library collection project this year by our efforts to raise the targeted average age in nonfiction books. Tremendous progress was also made in the last two years of changing the average copyright date from 2002 to

SUMMARY of EDDA COLLINS COLEMAN'S TALK at the JANUARY GENERAL MEETING

On Being Good, Caring, Ethical, and Non-partisan When Serving Constituents

Edda Collins Coleman, newly elected to Orinda Union School District board, was our speaker at the January membership meeting. Ms. Coleman is a managing director of Cogent Strate-

gies advising Fortune 50 companies as they communicate with congress and the executive branch. She is also a cofounder of *All In Together*, a nonprofit with the mission to equip voting age women with a non-partisan civic education; and chair of the board of directors of *Facing History and Ourselves* – equipping teachers with strategies and content that help young people wrestle with current events and difficult issues through the lens of history.



Campaign to train women to become civically engaged and gain confidence to speak in front of legislative committees to lobby for our issues. And her concern about what is not being taught about history in schools, she got involved with Facing History and Ourselves and is currently chair of that organization.

Ms. Coleman is a fantastic speaker and this article does not do her talk justice. A theme throughout her presentation was working for people (politicians) who are good people who cared and served their constituents in an ethical and non-partisan way. She said her focus on the Orinda school board will be a partnership with the City of Orinda, fiscal responsibility, and academic excellence. With the example of her family and mentors, commitment to

Ms. Coleman shared her personal story of growing up in the midwest in a family involved in the community and political campaigns. No wonder that she left for Washington, D.C., after college, where she got a job working for Virginia Governor Mark Warner lobbying congress for the state of Virginia. She then worked on democratic presidential campaigns. He expertise was growing in fundraising and lobbying, especially in the health care arena. When John Kerry lost, she was recruited by an insurance carrier to lobby for them. She decided to write a manual on how to lobby, after which she became a lobbyist for the American Pediatric Association. Her current employer was named one of the top lobby firms in D.C. in 2022.

She was disturbed by the fact that there were not many women in politics or lobbying. So she co-founded *All In Together*

HIKING EAST BAY REGIONAL PARKS First and Fourth Saturday
