BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS December 12, 2023

Marielle Boortz reported on a ZOOM meeting for Financial VPs in which 25 branches participated. There is a California State publication specifically for non-profits. AAUW California is working to provide us with more guidance regarding the new regulations which may apply to our branch.

The Mingle and Jingle Fundraiser on December 3 was a big success. Seventy- nine tickets were sold with seventy-two people in attendance. A good time was had by all. In January we will have a panel discussion by members of non-profits, including the Contra Costa Food Bank, Loaves and Fishes and St Mary's College. Members are asked to bring non-perishable food items to donate to the Food Bank.

Lobby Days will be held April 2 and 3. There will be an announcement in March of bills under consideration, which Assembly members will be participating and when training for the event will be held.

Our branch will begin attending school board meetings starting in January. An organization is being created to address the issue of banned books and how it may adversely affect school curriculum.

A committee has been formed to review the by-laws. National has mandated that certain provisions in the by-laws be verbatim. A vote will be held once the review is complete. National intends to have a vote on open membership next Spring. Both membership and revenue have been declining. OML, however, has 130 members.

Two books will be given to each student at Burckhalter at the winter break. Teachers will also be receiving two boxes of new books. The Stem conference will be held at Saint Mary's on March 15. Registration opens on January 29 and training for volunteers will be on March 10.



Meet Some of Our Workshop Presenters

These two workshop presenters will be in charge of Math Festival Fun. Here's what they have to say about the workshop:

Our goal is to show you how much fun math can be at a "Julia Robinson Math Festival." You'll explore some of our favorite math puzzles and play with math in the same way that mathematicians do. At the end of the festival, we'll show you how to access our free online math puzzles so that you can keep playing with fun and meaningful math at home.



Nancy Blachman enjoys being given mathematical puzzles and opportunities to explore and make discoveries. She founded the Julia Robinson Mathematics Festival (JRMF.org) to give opportunities for K-12 students (and others) to play with mathematical problems, puzzles, and games. Nancy prefers getting around town by bicycle to driving a car. At home,

Nancy often watches documentary films while rowing on her indoor rower. Born in Palo Alto, Nancy has also lived in New Jersey, Illinois, England, France, Israel, and Spain. Nancy has degrees from University of Birmingham (UK), UC Berkeley, and Stanford. She currently lives in Burlingame and has twins who are 23 years old.

Daniel Kline is the Executive Director of the Julia Robinson Mathematics Festival, a math education nonprofit on a mission to help all students build confidence, joy, and a positive identity around math. He first fell in love with math at the University of Chicago, where he got his BS in mathematics. He then went on to receive his master's in Mathematics Education



at the University of Pennsylvania, and spent some time as a high school math teacher in Northern California. His all-time favorite experience was studying abroad in Budapest, where he learned how to develop mathematical concepts through games and manipulatives. For the past three years, he has been excited to be able to apply what he learned there to his work at JRMF by developing fun and meaningful math experiences for both adults and children.

More About the Keynote Speaker

Saint Mary's Professor of Biology, **Dr. Sonya Schuh**, will provide the Keynote talk to kick off our 2024 STEM Conference. She is a passionate teacher, scientist, artist, proud mother, athlete, environmentalist, and "STEMinist."




Dr. Schuh's research includes areas of reproductive and developmental biology and toxicology. She explains, "My research focuses on uncovering the effects of endocrine-disrupting chemicals (EDCs), such as bishphenol A (BPA) and phthalates, found in cosmetics, personal care products, and plastics on embryo development, stem cells and human health. These ubiquitous chemicals are everywhere and used in a wide variety of daily products, are found in over 93 percent of people, and they're virtually unregulated here in the U.S., with several multi-million dollar industries producing and using them. Unfortunately, it's a clear case of 'profit over people' that we're working hard to expose and change."

Dr. Schuh and her all—woman undergraduate research team, the STEM Chicks (see photo above) are rare for this type of research which usually relies on graduate/doctoral level students. They were recently featured in a four-part series on HBO Max entitled "Not So Pretty." In episode three, their research on the effects of BPA, BPA alternatives, and phthalates on embryo development, toxins regularly found in beauty products and packaging, are highlighted. The Schuh team has since filmed for another upcoming documentary on plastics and fertility, and have published six manuscripts on their research in various high impact science journals, with this work being widely presented.

Dr. Schuh says, "Of all my accolades and work, my three amazing children are hands-down my best and proudest accomplishments (with my long list of wonderful students coming in second). We can all make a difference by the way we pursue answers and solutions, treat other people, and care for all people and life of this earth. Change begins in you."

JOY ELKINTON-WALKER ~ BOOK SIGNING ~

A long-time member of our branch's Memoirs and Musings interest group, Joy Elkinton-Walker has proudly published the memoir of her Grandmother's life which she has diligently worked on for several years. The book is titled *Jeanne LeBreton – Tragedy and Courage from France to San Francisco in the Early 1900's*. This is the fascinating story about how Joy's grand-



mother left France for a new life in America and ended up being stranded in the Panama Canal zone with only her wits and determination to support her young family.

Joy had copies of this beautiful book to show off at our December 13 Memoirs and Musings group meeting, and surprised all in attendance by presenting each of us with our very own copy. Since we had heard pieces of the story over time, we felt well acquainted with these members of Joy's family and their trials and accomplishments. The book was well researched, and the many photos it contains of people and places in the story help to bring it to life.
