... from DENISE'S PERSPECTIVE



As advocates for equity for women – I am sure you join me in the excitement of being so close to breaking the ultimate glass ceiling – the President of the United States! Many brave women blazed the trail to get to this point, and it is about time. But we can't take success for granted. There is still work to be done. Which is why AAUW and our OML Branch continue the work at the local level. *So what do we do?* OML members work to send girls to Tech Trek camp, put on the STEM Conference for middle school girls, provide

leadership training and mentoring through our ambassadorship program, and volunteer at Burckhalter Elementary School Library. We also provide scholarships to local high school girls and to first Generation women at Saint Mary's College who demonstrate leadership potential. We also send two women to AAUW's National Conference of College Student Women Leaders and advocate for public policy in our local communities. We just sent a Candidate Questionnaire to the school board candidates in the Acalanes and Lafayette school districts so we can let you know which candidates support AAUW's public policy priorities. Several of us will attend local postcard writing parties to get out the vote. Contact Laura Monin about dates so you can join us. We do it all to advance equity for women and girls.

I recently attended the Tech Trek Reunion event. The seven girls who were there, and the three high school girls who were camp counselors were so excited about their experience. We also began meeting with 17 Ambassadors who will help us put on the STEM Conference on March 8, 2025. We are giving them more responsibility this year and they are excited about developing leadership abilities. We know we positively impact the futures of the girls for whom and with whom we work.

You will hear a lot about the programs OML sponsors at our annual Showcase meeting on Tuesday, September 17. We are devoting this meeting to take a deeper dive into the work of our branch. Many of our members volunteer a lot of time to our projects, but we always need more help. It takes a large village to accomplish our work for the year. And we change the lives of these girls and young women. In addition, our membership will hear about and vote on the 2024-25 budgets, posted on page 8.

Our Action Plan for the year for all projects costs over \$48,000. We raise some of that money in various small fundraisers, donations throughout the year, plus registration fees collected for the STEM Conference. The fundraiser party we had the last two years, while very successful, took a lot of time from members who also run our projects, and it cost several of us a significant amount. For example, not counting the \$75 ticket for the event, I spent over \$300 on the prizes, plus my time to ask for, pick up, and prepare the prize baskets. So we created a new plan – a direct fundraising request to our members, from family and friends, and even parents of the girls we serve. It is called *Raising the Bar*. We will have a thank you celebration at the end of our drive for all members and donors. I hope you will join me in pledging as much as you can so our community outreach volunteers can spend more time working on the projects and less time fundraising. See you on September 17th.

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS August 13, 2024

Denise Burian took over the gavel from Gail Chesler and will lead use through 2024-25 AAUW-OML year.

A "Must See" September Meeting: The meeting will showcase our branch priorities along with our social activities. Additionally, the roll-out of a new fundraiser designed to replace our December event will be presented.

Membership: Currently, AAUW-OML has renewed over 100 members and expects the number to increase with new members. Goal is to expand our membership by 15% to 20%. Ideas to accomplish this expansion: evening programs that include an educational component (i.e., planning for retirement); target women moving into retirement; encourage our current membership to invite potential members to these educational programs and our meetings; improve and increase our advertising efforts

Public Policy: At our October meeting, women from the League of Women Voters will attend the meeting to discuss ballot propositions.

OML High School Initiative: Current junior and senior high school ambassadors have created a program promoting three (3) "Health Pillars" (priorities) for high school teenagers (Mental Health, Period Poverty and Healthcare & Medicine). A Project Proposal Request was presented to Denise Burian for AAUW-OML sponsorship consideration. The Mission of "Teens for Women's Health" is to combat gender health inequities.

Trek Tech: 80 to 82 girls attended the camp. Lamorinda had a great representation of counselors and presenters at the camp, including a workshop conducted by Gail Chesler. The reunion for the Stanley/OIS/Josquin Moraga camp attendees was held on August 23 at 7 pm at Miramonte Gardens. This is a great opportunity to hear from the girls about their experiences at camp.

We will be paying particular attention to the Acalanes Union High School District, as there are six candidates, both pro-public education and conservative candidates, on the ballot for two open seats. Once our Public Policy and DEI committees review the submissions, we will notify our members which candidates' responses are in line with AAUW's public policy priorities. Ongoing School Board Monitoring Efforts

OML members continue to monitor school board meetings in the Acalanes, Lafayette, Moraga, and Orinda Districts on a monthly basis (the Acalanes District frequently has two meetings a month). Our members often introduce themselves during the Public Comment portion of the meeting to tell the board members 1) who we represent; 2) that we support the needs of all students, academic freedom, protection from censorship, and bias-free education; and, 3) inform them about AAUW activities that support their students, e.g., Scholarships and Tech Trek. When appropriate, members will also comment on important, relevant agenda items, including topics such as DEI, curriculum, and staff and student support.

Last year, meetings got particularly heated when representatives from groups, such as *Moms for Liberty* and other extremist organizations, attended the meeting to promote their conservative, anti-public education agendas. SHAPING OUR FUTURE

As the co-chair of membership with Ling Yan I am excited to share with you our goals and action plans to help increase membership through outreach to soon-to-be and new retirees who are looking for ways to give back while reconnecting with their community and building friendships with women who share mutual interests. I am also the AAUW-OML liaison with Saint Mary's College under AAUW's National College and University Member Partnership. I have been networking with the faculty and department leaders for eight years.

Last spring I was referred to Myrna Santiago, Director of the Woman and Gender Studies program, and Maria Ruiz, Global Studies professor. They helped initiate the New Leadership Program at Saint Mary's – a one-week on-campus, residential intensive to prepare undergraduate women to pursue a career in public service and leadership. Myrna asked if our members could help her connect with various people to participate as speakers or leaders in residence. It was a privilege to refer Myrna to our members and our connections to women leaders in public office, both locally and beyond. This connection has opened doors for our branch to truly begin building a mutually beneficial relationship with the college and our branch. As a result, 10 young women participants applied to join AAUW as e-student members under the College and University Member Partnership program. These young women are looking forward to working with our branch to support our priorities, especially the STEM Conference, Public Policy and Voter initiatives and DEI. They will also have an opportunity to attend the AAUW National Conference for College Women Leaders (NCCWSL) next May at the University of Maryland.

Our goal is to continue to build this relationship to increase AAUW-OML's visibility in the Lamorinda Community and beyond. We hope to work together to provide programs and resources that make a difference as we work to support these rising stars and leaders in public office and community service careers.
