




13, 2025 at 3 pm, via Zoom. Members who have read it says it is a great and interesting book. Turn to page 9 for more information of the DEI Interest Group.

#### **SCHOLARSHIP UPDATES**



#### Nicole Hui Miramonte High School Graduate, Class of 2024

Each month we are featuring one scholarship awardee. Each young woman is actively engaged in her community and striving to learn about the problems and possibilities in our society.

Nicole Hui raised funds for Afghanistan refugee families and tutored students in the Keeping Our Promise program. By building relationships with these families, she helped them become self-sufficient. While volunteering in a living and memory care Nicole recognized that seniors and individuals facility. with issues of mobility needed supplies to allow them to move safely. She created I'mMOBILITY to collect gently used/ new medical equipment and supplies and deliver them free to those in need. She found that volunteering in a senior home and starting Operation I'mMOBILITY made her realize the importance of collaboration and patience when working with others. By working with different seniors and families donating equipment, Nicole also learned to appreciate other peoples' backgrounds and perspectives, understanding that everyone has a different story. Since she placed herself in sensitive environments with her service project, she felt she developed compassionate listening skills.

Nicole was also an Ambassador to the AAUW-OML STEM conference. As an Ambassador, she contacted people working in STEM via email to lead workshops. She spoke at local rotary clubs to raise awareness of women in STEM fields & raise funds. She shared her experience with the community and communicated how to get involved in STEM activities. She made an impact on middle school girls to help them feel comfortable to pursue STEM classes in high school and college, leading to careers in the medical field. Nicole is now a student at Cal Berkeley.

The Scholarship committee will not be meeting in December. Please join us at our January 9 meeting as we begin to plan for our interviews of some amazing applicants.

#### **PUBLIC POLICY**

#### A Successful 2024 Legislative Agenda

Thanks to the many AAUW members who participated in Lobby Days, to those who called or wrote to their legislators and the Governor through our Action Alert Network. Twenty nine of the 41 bills on AAUW's Legislative Agenda made it to the Governor's desk, and 25 of them have been signed into law! This represents an 86.2% success rate!

#### All three of our A-Priority bills were signed:

- AB 2843 Signed into law! Authored and sponsored by AAUW California and carried by Assembly member Cottie Petrie-Norris. This bill eliminates cost sharing from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical care following a rape ensuring that survivors can receive the care they need following a traumatic sexual attack.
- AB 2326 Signed into law! Sponsored by AAUW California and authored by Assembly member David Alvarez. This bill requires the Chancellors of the Community Colleges and the State Universities, and the President of the University of California, to provide an annual report, publicly and orally presented, of their schools' compliance with Title IX.
- AB 2099 Signed into law! Authored by Assembly members Rebecca Bauer-Kahan and Kevin McCarty. This bill makes it possible for the District Attorney to pursue felony charges for the posting of information about reproductive health care patients or providers if the posting and subsequent actions result in bodily injury.

#### Two of our B-priority bills were signed:

- AB 1790 Signed into law! Authored by Assembly member Damon Connolly. This bill requires the CSU system to report on the implementation of recommendations provided in the California State Auditor report, to ensure Title IX compliance and protections against sexual harassment.
- AB 1831 Signed into law! Authored by Assembly member Marc Berman.
   This bill expands the law prohibiting the possession and distribution of material depicting minors performing sexual activities to include AI and computer-generated images.

**And very significantly,**: AB 1955 was signed. This was a C priority bill only because it was added to our Legislative Agenda later in the process.

 AB 1955 - Signed into law! This bill, authored by Assembly member Chris Ward, prohibits public schools from notifying parents if their child uses a different name or pronouns or identifies as a different gender than assigned at birth. California is the first state in the nation to ban forced outing of transgender students.

The League of Women Voters says that the ERA (which was ratified by enough states but not within an arbitrary deadline) can be published in the Constitution at President Biden's request. Please read and consider signing by clicking here:

Also making a phone call or email to the President and the Vice President with this same request would help. Please pass this on to your friends who support equal rights for women.

# SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

We are very pleased with the results of the local school board elections, with propublic education candidates our chapter supported winning in both the Acalanes Union High School and Moraga Districts. Paul Chopra and incumbent Wendy Reicher won in the Acalanes District. Stephanie Dickerson and Lee Hays won seats in the Moraga District.

We continue to have a strong and active presence monitoring local school board meetings. Following their "victory" in the recent Presidential election, Moms for Liberty have renewed their efforts to fight school board agenda items that are contrary to their beliefs. One topic is opposing acknowledgment of the LGBTQ+ community, including proclamations that recognize them.

Thanks go to Karen Feeney, Denise Burian, Laura Monin, Christine Walwyn, and Jeanette Meyer for attending the recent Acalanes District Board meeting and supporting its efforts to pass proclamations recognizing numerous disenfranchised members of our society, including the Mexican/Latino, Filipino, Native American. Black/African American, Women, Disabled, Jewish, Muslim/Arab American, Asian, Pacific Islander & Desi American, and LGBTQAI+ communities. We are currently looking for AAUW members who are interested in monitoring either, or both, the Moraga and Orinda School Board meeting agendas, and attend meetings as needed.

**Note:** Dr. Chris Severson resigned from the AUHSD at the recent Board meeting. The remaining Acalanes High school district members will make a decision about what steps to take. They can either call a special election or appoint a candidate. We will know what process they will use in time for our next Triad.

#### STEM CONFERENCE UPDATE



The STEM Committee members and Ambassadors have been busy planning for our March 8, 2025 STEM Conference. Sandy Fox-Sohner has secured our conference speaker - **Misty Davis.** 

Misty grew up wanting to be a veterinarian, a writer, a mother, and a scientist. To fulfill some of those dreams, Dr. Davies says, "I am discovering how to make sure the programs we design at NASA and use for flight really do what they are supposed to do." She earned an undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering from Northern Arizona University. Thereafter, she completed Master's and Ph.D. degrees in aerospace/astrospace engineering and mechanical engineering, leading Dr. Davies to NASA Ames as a research computer engineer.

True to her childhood ambitions to be many things when she grew up, Dr. Davies' path to NASA came only after holding positions as a Shakespearean actress, a waitress, and a veterinary technician. Along the way, she studied how albatrosses fly across the ocean without flapping their wings and why rubber is so stretchy. She is also a mother and learns something new from her two children every day. "All of this learning from so many diverse areas helps me think of new and different ways to approach the problems that NASA is solving in order to make the world a better place," said Dr. Davies.

Stacia Cragholm has been working to secure our workshop presenters and we have confirmed 14 presenters! We will have some similar topics such as FBI Evidence, Cool Chemistry, Exploring the Human Brain, etc along with some new topics - the Awesome Power of Genetics, Math Art, and more. Chris Laszcz-Davis has been reaching out to local Rotaries and community groups to help secure funding to support our conference.

# NOVEMBER AAUW FUND MEETING

At the November general meeting, our speaker was Faith Bennett, a current recipient of a National Fellowship given by AAUW to students in graduate work. This is a very prestigious award; former recipients have been Madame Curie, Sylvia Plath and Susan Sontag to mention a few very well-known and famous scholars. Faith is working on a Ph.D. in U.S. History with a focus on gender and labor. Her dissertation is on Food Service workers in San Francisco from 1940-1980. During that time many changes took place in the labor force and her studies address the changing focus of unions and how that affected food service workers in particular.

Faith told us about her own work history in the food service industry starting at the age of 14 in Florida, and how if you stayed there, you really could not advance to a better job and were more or less stuck as a "working class" woman without an idea of a better life. Taking Community College courses in Florida enabled her to then attend the University of Florida where she received a BA. After working for several years in NYC at the Tenement Museum she went on to pursue a graduate degree. She told us that she had UC Davis in her sights as there were two professors she wanted to study with in her field. Right now, Faith has finished all of her course work and the grant she has received from AAUW will enable her

> to finish her dissertation without a lot of distractions. We wish her well!
