#### ... from DENISE'S PERSPECTIVE

March has been a great month so far - We put on a successful STEM Conference for 170 middle school girls, with 48 of our members volunteering for this event. A full third of our membership participated even while many of you were also working on the Tech Trek and Scholarship applications. Thank you for always

showing up when needed.

We also celebrated YOU in our Thank YOU party in appreciation of your donations to our "Raise the Bar" Fundraiser. Ninety members (and OML friends) made donations, some very significant. For an organization of 140 members, our level of engagement is outstanding. We can't say thank you enough. A committee, led by Jan Cushman, developed a strategy for how to allocate the funds between the community projects. They made a recommendation to the OML board, who approved distribution of \$21,500 to our community outreach project. Your generosity resulted in STEM receiving \$7,100, Scholarship gaining \$5,835, Tech Tech will get \$4,915, and Burckhalter Library \$3,650. We will retain \$5,000 in unallocated to be available to projects as needed.

We had a great general meeting about how to protect yourself from scams and fraud. If you get as many spam emails as I do, it feels like a full time job to protect ourselves. At this meeting, our Distinguished Woman committee, led by 2024-25 DW Laura Wittenberg, announced our 2025-2026 Distinguished Woman Lana Reichick. This was a well-deserved recognition for many years of work on behalf of many OML community projects. Please look for the invitation soon for the luncheon on Monday, May 5th.

Our membership also voted to approve the election of officers for the 2025-2026 year. Our branch is very lucky in that we have a large engaged Board of Directors. Our elected officers are: Denise Burian, President, President-elect -vacant, Marcy Place, Secretary, Peggy Cabaniss, Finance VP, Danielle Ginestro, AAUW Fund VP, Chris Laszcz-Davis & Gail Chesler, Program VPs. We also have many appointed members. I will write more about these positions next month. Many of us are staying in our positions for another year and I thank the board for stepping up and doing this extra work. Board members can serve for up to two years, with a third year in special circumstances, which we have used for Finance VP since this position requires proficiency in Quickbooks. If several of us are in our second year, then next year we will need many OML members to be willing to serve on the Board. If YOU think this is something you would like to do next year, or future year, please contact me (or another board members) to have a discussion about it and I (we) will try to find a role in which you can be paired with a board member and be a mentee to learn about the position.

There are many ways to get involved in our branch in April. First, sign up for the May 5th luncheon, when you receive the invitation. It is to honor our Distinguished Woman Lana Reichick, our Named Gift Honoree (to be announced that day), and installation of officers. Second, join us on Thursday, April 17th for pizza at Mountain Mikes. It is a fundraiser for Tech Trek. You can order all day (take-out or in-restaurant) and mention AAUW. Or you can join some of us at the restaurant for dinner (no-host) party. And third, attend our special general meeting on Sunday, April 27th at 3:00 p.m. It will be a chance to meet the high school seniors and Saint Mary's students who are our scholarship recipients, as well as our rising 8th graders who were selected for Tech Trek camp this summer.

#### BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS MARCH 11, 2025

- Lobby Days registration is still open to participate. Event is April 8th and 9th. April 8th will be in person in Sacramento. April 9th will be a Zoom event.
- The Board unanimously approved support for Measure T, a mail only measure in the May 6th special election. (Read more about this on page X).
- Our annual May Luncheon will be held on Monday, May 5, at La Finestra Restaurant in Moraga. The cost per person will be the same as last year (\$48/person).
- The STEM Conference committee received many congratulations and thanks for the fabulous job at our conference. 165 student attendees (sold out in two weeks), 120 volunteers (45 were high school students). NOTE: Next year's conference is calendared for March 7th.
- Karen Feeney is selling t-shirts with AAUW specific graphics (front: AAUW-OML, back: Equity for All) to wear to events, such as school board meetings, to show our presence and unity behind our message(s). T-shirts will be for sale at \$32.80/shirt at our March meeting or contact Karen Feeney, if interested.
- The Scholarship committee interviewed 16 high school applicants and made their selections. Saint Mary's students are still working on applications and interviews will be scheduled shortly.
- Trek Tech Camp selections are underway and our branch has received permission for a 7th camper to attend Camp Hopper. Reminder: Trek Tech committee will be hosting a fundraiser at Mountain Mike's Pizza in Moraga on April 17th. Twenty percent of proceeds will be given to AAUW-OML.

#### FOCUS ON ... 2025 OUR DISTINGUISHED WOMAN ~ LANA REICHICK!

Each year, as a branch, we recognize an AAUW member who has set herself apart and distinguished herself in initiative, creativity, leadership, friendship, and a steadfast commitment to advancing gender equity for women and girls.



Sometimes the individuals who do 80% of the work get 20% of the credit. We have had a "Hidden Figure" in our midst. Introducing **Lana Reichick**, the AAUW-OML Distinguished Woman of 2025, is an honor. Lana has been a member of AAUW since 1989, when Judy Helder suggested she join to make new friends with interesting women working for equity for all women.



I have learned, as I have listened to Lana's history with AAUW-OML and the Moraga Community. Lana is a powerhouse! In I983, Lana, a single mother, was moved to Moraga to fill a newly created position at Macy's California. As Fashion Director for Shoes, Accessories, Lingerie & Cosmetics, she led the building of a new fashion office with four fashion

coordinators hired to give color and fashion trend direction to dozens of buyers in the \$400 million dollar division of Macy's. Lana says she "pointed." She got to do the fun stuff – influencing shoe, accessories and lingerie buyers as they traveled the world together. (She has many stories to tell). Six years later, when the funding for her successful, influential fashion office was eliminated, she made a life decision. She would not chase a big fashion job and move her sons Adam and Brenn again. She would

stay to educate her sons in Moraga's excellent schools. Life happened, with setbacks and disappointments, but Lana never wavered in her determination to provide the best education and life possible for her sons. She persevered. Working full time in "survival jobs," Lana convinced the Father-Boy Scout Troop to accept her as the participating parent because the

men's troop meetings were at night. The men in the troop were always supportive. Her new-found Moraga Village guided and supported her sons.

We do not have room to list all the hats Lana wears as a very active member of OML. In AAUW, she found a group of interesting women working together for a purpose. While working full time, in the 1990s and

2000s, she served on the boards of nine

OML presidents, including two years leading AAUW Fund/LAF. For three years, she led a dynamic New Members interest group.

In 1998, Tech Trek was founded. After reading the AAUW-CA research report that followed the first ten years of Tech Trek campers, she realized AAUW-CA's science and math camp was truly changing young girls lives. STEM girls were finding their people! She worked on Pat Lopker's big team selling tickets to a special one-time Tech Trek Garden Tour. That huge branch success allowed OML to double our Tech Trek sponsorships. She became a core member of the OML crew that sold beer at 49ers games at Candlestick for a decade, generating thousands for Tech Trek sponsorships. After the Niners moved to Levi Stadium, she looked to replace those critical dollars. Single-handedly, she influenced 5A Rent-A-Space to partner with AAUW's strong volunteers on the annual Shred Fest. Ten years of shred events have now generated thousands for Tech Trek. For fifteen years, she has been the Tech

Trek Committee's liaison to JM School, working with Tech Trek parents to escort their daughters through the application/interview process.

#### **PUBLIC POLICY ~ MEASURE T**

#### **OML Board Endorses Measure T on May 6 Ballot**

The AAUW-OML Branch Board of Directors voted to endorse and support the Acalanes Union High School District (AUHSD). Measure T, which is a \$130 parcel tax measure on the May 6, 2025 special election ballot. A parcel tax is paid with your property taxes. Seniors (0ver 65) can apply for an exemption. Apply by May 1st for the next year's taxes. You only have to apply once with auto renewal.

Acalanes District includes five high schools: Acalanes, Campolindo, Las Lomas, Miramonte, and Acalanes Center for Independent Study. It is among the highest performing districts in CA, but one of the lowest in funding received per student from the state. As costs increase year after year, funding is not keeping up, not to mention the uncertainties of funding in this political environment. **Measure T will bring in \$4.5 million annually to the school district.** It will allow the AUHSD to continue offering the advanced academic programs, attract and retain highly qualified teachers, provide library services, academic counseling and career training, keep technology up to date, and provide instructional equipment, materials, and supplies. The measure requires an independent citizens' oversight committee and mandatory annual audits.

Measure T will be on a Special Election Ballot. It is a vote by mail only. Ballots will be mailed out on April 7th and must be returned by Tuesday, May 6th. It requires 2/3 yes vote to pass. You can return the ballot by mail or take it to a local drop box at Lafayette School District Offices, Moraga Library, Orinda City Hall, or Walnut Creek City Hall. We encourage you to vote yes to support our local high schools. Encourage your relatives and friends to vote yes too. Contact Denise if you want a yard sign.

#### **Tried and True Tutoring**

The Scholarship Committee has been fortunate to partner with Tried and True Tutoring (T&T) for the past few years as a fundraising resource. T&T offers various ways to prepare high school students to take SAT and ACT college prep exams including boot camps and comprehensive courses. This is done in partnership with local high schools and parent organizations.

The Scholarship Committee first made contact with T&T in 2016 through local high school counselors. We partnered with them until COVID stopped group gatherings and then started up again in 2023 through this year. We receive 10% of T&T's revenue from the events in exchange for us doing the paperwork to reserve a room for the classes held at local high schools and we set up the room the day of the event. This year we participated in a boot camp at Miramonte High School in the fall and a prep class and boot camp at Campolindo High School in the spring. The Committee received \$2,881.25 this year from these endeavors.

Bonnie Fend and Jill Fernald are the Committee members who handle this fundraiser. They have been impressed by the professionalism and enthusiasm of the T&T instructor, Ryan Burke, who credits T&T as an organization that takes great care to provide students with engaging and useful content. Although we never know from year to year how many T&T events the high school counselors will pair us up with, we are thrilled that this is a community fundraiser that does not depend on AAUW members to fund.

#### Math Festival at Burckhalter

Burckhalter had a Math Festival on March 13th at which seven AAUW members attended: Laura Wittenberg, Barbara Bell, Pam Docherty, Judy Helder, Renee Rosado, Lisa Gedigian and Janette Maher. We volunteered to assist at game/activity stations. Everyone was excited to play and learn math strategy. The Julia Robinson organization provided the program and materials. One of the activities at the Math Festival was a game called Pentominoes. Pentominoes is a domino like puzzle piece with five squares all connected to each other. There are six different puzzle pieces, each with a different shape.

Once the students are introduced to the rules, they immediately start to mix and match the pentomino puzzle pieces onto the map. When they have successfully figured out how the pieces fit on the map, then they can continue playing to the next level.



The key was to show the boy in the photo above with Renee Rosado, where the first piece belonged on the puzzle and then ask him to find the next piece. It was great to see his reaction when he solved the puzzle.

#### **MARCH MEETING TAKE-AWAY**



Some of the scariness in today's real world is well understood, some, not so much. Scary things like identity theft, elder abuse, phishing (what's that?) are now part of our day-to-day life. Yes, this is scary: the FBI says "Seniors lose more than \$3 billion each year to financial scams."

Our speaker at the March General meeting, **Attorney Emily Milstein** (in middle of photo), opened our eyes in several areas. Let's share some takeaways. First, we learned that the organization from which she came to us EXISTED. The organization is the Contra Costa Senior Legal Services. They offer free legal services for seniors over 60. This non-profit organization offers to help you. Their focus includes Elder Abuse, Consumer Protections, Debt issues, Planing documents (such as healthcare directives and powers of attorney). You can contact Contra Costa Senior Legal Services at (925) 609-7900.

Emily's presentation answered many of the questions we ought to have, e.g., who abuses elders? Her answers are family members, caregivers, friends, scam artists. Emily walked us through "scams" and "frauds" and shared stories of real cases. Some of those real cases might have struck a few of us as being awfully close to home. We heard about Red Flags – language that warns us off. If you hear that your grandson is stuck in the airport and needs money to get home – probably not true. Our own Q&A time was interesting and fruitful as well.

A couple of DOs and DON'Ts to consider: DO review your monthly bank and credit card statements. DON'T open email attachments from unknown folks, DON'T answer the phone unless you recognize the caller. DO report scams to the source, such as Amazon, your bank. The FBI has a report line. Don't tell anyone your bank account numbers (routing number and account number) unless you really know they are working FOR YOU. If you think you are being scammed, DO hang up. DO go slowly with financial decisions; think it through – get some counsel. It's fine to be independent in our old ages; it's also good to talk about big financial decisions with someone you truly trust.

Emily shared her slides with us. Our webmaster will be uploading them to the website. One of the slides has contact information for reporting scams – if you do report it, someone else may be protected from that scammer.
