... from DENISE'S PERSPECTIVE

I am so sorry I had to miss one of my favorite meetings of the year – our annual Showcase, where our leaders describe our community outreach projects and the direct impact we make in the lives of young women and girls. Our goal is to advance equity for women and girls and we do this through advocacy, education, and our

projects. While we have a very engaged membership in which 50% of our members are actively involved in leading and/or volunteering for our projects, I encourage new members to jump in and get involved. Each of our outreach priorities will welcome you with open arms and you will feel good about the direct impact you can make. And then, to reward yourself for doing good work, check out our special interest groups and do something fun, educational, intellectually stimulating – all of which will also result in building friendships. So dive in, join some of these groups. You'll be glad you did.

I am very excited about our October 21st member meeting. Several of us have been attending school board meetings for two years to support our educators and ensure that our great schools don't get pressured to ban books or pull back on diversity in curriculum. Schools are making good progress in providing a safe educational environment for all students, and we don't want to backslide. As a result of our involvement, we know the candidates supporting AAUW public policy priorities for education. Then the Acalanes Union High School District election issue arose on converting to trustee area elections from the current at-large elections. Refer to the details provided in this Triad by our public policy team on this as well on Proposition 50 which is on the CA November ballot. It will be an outstanding program and I am looking forward to hearing from Assemblywoman Rebecca Bauer Kahan and Acalanes district leaders on these important issues.

I am very happy to report that AAUW National has revised their strategic plan. They identified three strategic priorities and I summarize them here:

- 1. Fund High Education Provide grants and fellowships; support women in academia and research; and build networks for alumnae to lead and expand AAUW's global reach.
- 2. Remove Barriers to Success in Education and the Workplace champion legislation; promote inclusive, safe, and accessible ed. environments through Title IX and civl rights.
- 3. Strengthen AAUW's Reach with a renewed focus on supporting an effective network of states and branches through aligned strategies and initiatives like the Five-Star Program; Grow organizational sustainability through member engagement and impact evaluation.

I love the new emphasis on supporting and developing local branches. AAUW-CA stepped up its support of branches over the last several years. Now National is too. AAUW can be more impactful when our activities and advocacy are aligned.

One area the board decided would be a priority this year in terms of governance and a succession plan is to encourage more members to take on leadership roles, like starting out as co-chairs of positions on our board. While we decided this in June, it became even more critical when two of our key members came down with serious medical conditions over Labor Day weekend – Laura Wittenberg and me. We will both make a complete recovery but it reconfirmed our commitment to build on our succession plan so we have the depth we need to complete our projects this year and into the future. And new leaders who feel ready to take on more responsibility as we recruit for new board members every year. Please think of your skills and offer them to the organization so we can remain a strong impactful organization. *Thank you*.


A Tech Trek Alumni Group for the Greater Bay Area is being formed. The group will have Zoom gatherings, a Speaker series and do field trips.

FOCUS ON ... PROPOSITION 50 & OUR LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL ELECTION SYSTEM

Acalanes Union High School District (AUHSD) New "Trustee Area" Election System





Although AUHSD had not yet made this transition, in May an out-of-town lawyer threatened to sue unless the district complied. To get into compliance, AUHSD began developing map options to divide the district into five new trustee areas balancing population, ethnicity, income distribution, protected groups, and communities of interest (among other considerations). The board will adopt one of these map options on October 15, which will guide all future trustee elections.

During this presentation, you will learn:

- Why the new system was required.
- How the maps were developed and what factors were considered.
- Which map was adopted and why.
- Potential implications of "By Trustee Area" elections, including effects on future board representation.

There will be time for audience questions following the two presentations, along with table discussions to share perspectives.

Proposition 50 and Its Important Role in Shaping National Politics



Assemblymember Rebecca Bauer-Kahan will educate us about Proposition 50, the California ballot measure that will ask voters on November 7 to approve a new, temporary congressional map that, if passed, would apply only to the 2026 and 2028 elections and expire in 2030, when the next census triggers the regular redistricting cycle.

The California measure is a response to "partisan gerrymandering" in Republican-led states such as Texas and Missouri. At the urging of President Trump, both states are redrawing their state's congressional seats to create more favorable districts for the GOP, which could help the party maintain control of the U.S. House. Supporters of Prop 50 argue this temporary change is needed to offset those efforts and protect representative democracy. Opponents counter that it undermines California's independent Citizens Redistricting Commission and could tilt our maps toward electing Democrats.

Assemblywoman Bauer-Kahan will address why Democrats in the California State Legislature agreed to move forward with legislation to call for this special election and what the impact of this Congressional Redistricting will be if the measure passes. She will speak to what this means for the Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission who oversees redistricting and will also share how Proposition 50, if passed, could affect California's influence in congress.

~ PROPOSITION 50 - WHY IT MATTERS ~

What's at stake:

Whether or not California continues to use its independent Citizens Redistricting Commission or shifts to a different process that would set the state's congressional maps for the 2026 and 2028 elections.

Temporary change:

If Prop 50 passes, the Citizens Redistricting Commission would resume in 2030, when the next census triggers a full redistricting cycle.

Supporters say:

It safeguards democracy and offsets partisan redistricting in states like Texas, Missouri, and Florida.

Opponents say:

It undermines California's citizen-led process and risks maps that don't reflect all voters.

AAUW Lens:

Supporting Prop 50 does not align with a particular party; it aligns with AAUW's long-standing mission to advance equity for women and girls and to protect the freedoms AAUW has championed for well over a century.

SUPPORT FOR PROP 50 A NON-PARTISON MOVE

The approval of Proposition 50 by California voters in November 2025 will set redistricting efforts in California for the next election cycles, until maps are redrawn after the next census in 2030. With its passage, we will experience a short-term loss of state democratic, people-centered control of redistricting. This effort can also appear to have partisan benefits.

We are experiencing creeping authoritarian efforts to undermine fair representation, trusted information, and democratic norms. This condition, paired with federal encroachment, threatens many of the values we care about, including AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Although California maintains strong protections for women and girls, marginalized peoples, free speech, accurate history, sound science, and democratic norms, we remain subject to federal laws, rules, and enforcement actions.

A short-term loss of people-centered redistricting can be seen as an investment in a democratic future—one in which the will of all people is more fully recognized. "While this kind of redistricting is often framed as an escalation of a partisan conflict, in the current political environment, we should think carefully about what is being labeled as partisan," said Dr. Melissa (Missy) Maceyko, expert in effective social change and political action, and co-chair of AAUW California's Public Policy Committee. "Partisan labeling can be reductive when the choice has become one of supporting authoritarianism or preserving functional democracy and protecting the rights of all people," she added.

AAUW California reminds all Californians that support for Proposition 50 is a non-partisan move to preserve democratic norms in California, resist Project 2025, and continue advancing gender equity through AAUW's mission and policy priorities.



She also taught classes at the Saint Mary's Center WE-CONNECT department to help seniors master technology challenges. Rebecca helped set up technology to make it senior-user friendly. She is an honors student and very active on campus as the Vice President of Finance for the SMC Associated Students Executive Team.

Rebecca credits her mom for her wise words and in helping her realize that power exists within her. She hopes to do the same for other young women looking to empower themselves and create their own purposes.

AAUW-OML Branch, the Lamorinda Sunrise Rotary, and the SMC campus's Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion sponsored a one-day conference on "Women's Leadership in the Current Political Moment," hosted by NEW Leadership Institute at Saint Mary's College.

The keynote speaker was Gilda Gonzalez, M.P.A., an SMC alumna and the outgoing President and CEO of Planned Parenthood of Northern California. The Mayor of Oakland, Barbara Lee, closed the conference. Participants of the panel discussion included the Mayor of Berkeley, Adena Ishii; the Mayor of El Cerrito, Carolyn Wysinger; and Richmond City Council Member, Claudia Jimenez. Participation at each presentation ranged from 70 to 80 individuals, a notable showing by College standards.

The goals for the conference were achieved, demonstrating to the SMC administration that there is local and regional interest in the NEW Leadership Program and interest among students to apply for the 2026 Summer Institute. After the conference, the Office of Community Outreach from the Oakland Mayor's office contacted us to discuss ways to collaborate with SMC and our Women and Gender Studies


THE 2025-2026 DIRECTORY
