### FOCUS ON ... FOLLOW-UP of OML'S PUBLIC POLICY GENERAL MEETING

### October General Meeting Educates Members on Key Political Issues Facing Local Voters

The Public Policy Committee put together an engaging and very timely program for our October 21 General Meeting. The audience, including a number of guests and new members, stayed attentive throughout. No one left early.

The first speaker was local Assemblywoman, Rebecca Bauer-Kahan. The primary focus of her presentation was Prop 50, the November 4 ballot measure approved by the California legislature as a response to "partisan gerrymandering" in Republican-led states. If passed, Prop 50 will approve a temporary congressional map that would potentially give California Democrats five more seats in Congress. The new map would apply only to the 2026 and 2028 elections and expire in 2030, when the next census triggers the regular redistricting cycle.

Dr. Nickerson also said how much he appreciates our Branch's support for the District over the last two to three years, with

our members attending Board Meetings and speaking in support of their efforts. Branch President, Denise Burian spoke briefly about how our AAUW values of ensuring a fair and unbiased education, as well as a safe environment for all students, aligned perfectly with the District's values.

The day solidified our relationships with both the Assemblywoman and the District. We look forward to working together in the future.

Bauer-Kahan emphasized the importance of approving this legislation. She said under any other circumstances she would not support this type of legislation; however, she said we are in unusual times and the future of our democracy depends on balancing Congress. As an example, she described attending a meeting with John Muir executives the previous day where they told her, since 40% of their clients receive medical care from the Affordable Care Act or Medi Cal and would not be able to afford medical care if premium subsidies cut by the Republican majority are not reinstated. John Muir would be forced to close their doors.

Next, Dr. John Nickerson and School Board Member, Nancy Kendzierski, with the Acalanes Union High School District, presented the background, selection process, final map, and implications of the new Trustee Area Election System, adopted by the District on October 15. No longer will the District's five school board members be elected by all voters in the District. Instead, each board member will be elected by

## School Boards -The Overlooked Frontline of Democracy Written by Kathi Harper, Chair, Public School Board Project, AAUW California

Last month, Seena Trigas from the Public Policy School Board Project team, submitted an excellent article reminding members of the crucial role that public education plays in our democracy. The current – and seemingly never-ending - assaults on that institution gave rise to the School Board Project, which is now entering its third year.

When we started this project, our main focus initially was to encourage members to actively participate in identifying, recruiting and supporting candidates to run for school boards whose education values were in line with ours at AAUW California. For a number of reasons, our focus shifted to an emphasis on encouraging and training members to attend school board meetings and let us know what they are seeing in their districts. We had a remarkable response, and we want to thank all our members who have answered that call.

As we enter our third iteration of the project, we want to continue that momentum, but narrow the scope to watching for and speaking out against violations of California's protective laws; add a new component of learning how to make a greater impact by working in coalition with other public education supportive organizations; and swing back to where we started with re-engaging and increasing our efforts to ensure district board majorities that support all students and the free flow of ideas. In this last regard, we have recently discovered an organization called the School Board Integrity Project, and I can't say it better than their Executive Director, Kyrstin Schuette, as stated in an Op-Ed she wrote in The Courier.

Introducing one of our High School Awardees! EMMA WONG Miramonte High School Class of 2025

Emma was an AAUW tech trek alumni and she helped with a virtual summer camp for a week. In her high school community, Emma was on the Cross Country and track team. She was the on-line editor-in-chief and the Editor at Large for *The Mirador*. She was president of the writing club. Emma was also the founder/editor-in-chief of re-imagine literary magazine. Three years ago, she and two friends decide to lead an independent research project to investigate levels of mental and academic burnout in her school community, with interesting results! They are now partnering with Stanford University's nonprofit Challenge Success to author a research paper with their findings.

Emma has also been active outside her school community. She has been involved with the Lamorinda Arts council and has been part of the poetry open mic. She saw that her peers were not involved, so found a way to involve them by creating a youth ambassador program. She also was a volunteer with the UCSF Walnut Creek sports medicine for young athletes which inspired her to pursue a pre-med path.

Many of the traits used to describe her are creative, confident, professional, respect for others, a listener, and consideration of others and willingness to create opportunities for the growth of others. Thank you to the supportive crew at 5A Rent-A-Space. Manager George, Jay, and Bashar started at 7:00 a.m. to prep the tent, tables, and entry to the back lot. 5A supplied Starbuck's coffee, chilled water, and giveaways—always with a smile.

Our long standing crew is the best. Most have worked shred day for 8-10 years. Jan Cushman, our talker, asks every driver for donations—the toughest job on the lot. Steve & Sandy Sohner and Mark Ginestro, a Tech Trek dad, worked the boxes. New shred team members, Joanie Jump and three more from the Ginestro Tech Trek family joined us. Danielle Ginestro worked as a runner with Tech Trekkers, Sadie and Anna handing red Shred Day receipt cards to the drivers. Joanie Jump worked as a runner for three full hours, handling that busy 11th hour on her own! (Kudos, Joanie! You were A.Mazing.) The bankers table included Christine Walwyn back at the cash box, Judy Helder keeping the list, and Bonnie Fend handling Square transactions with Peggy Cabaniss for extra support. Long time shred day volunteers Sharon Doi and Michael Swan have moved to the Northwest, but member Sharon still helped with key publicity online. Thanks, Sharon.

Finally, thanks to those community rabbits who popped out of the hat in the 11th hour and gave us another successful Shred Day at 5A. At 12:30, we exhaled. *Thank you for your support*.



Thank you to everyone who supported the Shred Event-we made over \$1,900! And thank you to those who joined in the Walnut Creek Restaurant Walk – we made over \$430! And thank you for the additional donations many of you have made. Our budget is in good shape to send seven girls to camp this coming summer.

I attended a meeting last night with the other branch coordinators and our state Tech Trek director, Dr. Mary Isaac. Here are some highlights from the meeting:

- 780 girls registered for camps from 103 branches and 752 girls attended camp. Speculation is that some of the noshows were related to immigration worries. There were 318 volunteer staff.
- Statewide, Tech Trek finished the camping summer with a surplus of about \$53,000. That money will be used this coming summer. Great to not have a deficit.
- Fees will stay the same for next year \$1,200 for each girl for Camp Hopper at Santa Clara University. Good news! The tentative date for camp at Santa Clara in 2026 is July 5-11.
- All volunteers who help with the review of applications, interviews and selection of girls as well as volunteers at camp will be required to complete the conduct agreement again this coming year.
- The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) requiring us to declare the number of campers we want to send will be coming in early January. Denise will sign it.
- The girls' record of MMR vaccination entered into Camp-Doc will be mandatory again. Their record of covid vaccination or a declination also will be required again. The covid requirement comes from the universities.
- The state is working on a video aimed at informing teachers about the selection process. Apparently, some branches that approach middle schools every second or third year feel they need to provide consistent information for the teachers. We are fortunate to have only three schools to work with some branches have up to 10-12 schools from which to draw girls.

I encourage you to read the page 7 article in the October Triad about the C/U partnership with Saint Mary's College (SMC). It is a great summary of the recent work Laura Wittenberg has been doing with the programs there. SMC was a partner many years ago but we let that partnership slide away. Laura saw the value in reigniting it and worked with SMC Admin., their women's faculty group and other leaders to encourage SMC to "re-up" their partnership with AAUW. They did! Our Scholarship committee continues to provide scholarships to SMC students in their High Potential First Gen program. We've sent SMC students to the AAUW National NCCWSL program, a national leadership conference for women college students. AAUW National is asking Branches to encourage partner schools students to attend the 2026 event.

Laura has been instrumental in developing the Saint Mary's College relationships over 8 years. Our scholarships and the STEM Conference contributes to our partnership and our impact and reputation on campus. She has supported leadership speaker events and mentored students. She, with OML members, have been instrumental in support of the "New Leadership Institute" program that is sponsored by the Women and Gender Studies Program. AAUW-OML Branch, the Lamorinda Sunrise Rotary, and the SMC campus's Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion sponsored a one-day conference on "Women's Leadership in the Current Political Moment," hosted by NEW Leadership Institute at Saint Mary's College.
