Dear Members, It is Christmas Eve morning as I am writing this. The calm before the “storm” in my house. Seven grandkids are visiting, along with their parents, of course. I am blessed. Not only by my family, but by my membership in AAUW-OML. I have gained so many great friends, plus an organization through which I can make a small difference. I hope you have found this as well.

You are receiving this on January 1st. I hope you had a healthy and nice holiday season. New Years marks a time for introspection and expectations. I ask you to think about how to play a bigger role in OML, as our nomination committee is beginning work in January on the 2026-27 slate of officers. Our branch is engaged in many major projects that will come to fruition this spring. Scholarship and Tech Trek interview and choose their awardees, the STEM Conference in March 7th (sign up to volunteer in January as OML members get first dibs), our Burckhalter librarians are operating the library every week, and DEI is prepping for the January 20th member meeting and operating our book lending library. And our fundraising committee will be busy planning an event, probably in March. The Program Committee and Public Policy Committee are also very active. Our partnership with Saint Mary's College (SMC) is solid. More than 50% of our members volunteer for one of the projects above and also contribute. It is very appreciated.

I try to give a shout out to everyone who volunteers their time and treasures OML because it is no small thing. For some of us, it is our primary organization or one of them and we give a lot of time. It is worth it. Not only for the relationships we develop, but our activities impact 200 students at Burckhalter, 180 middle school girls through STEM and Tech Trek, And 40-50 high school girls in the ambassador and high school monitor programs. At least 6 college women (or soon to be) through significant scholarships giving them a head start to the year. That is about 430 we directly impact. Not to mention the impact we have through our public policy, DEI and SMC partnership. Thank you.

Some dates to remember:

- STEM Conference registration opens on January 12th. We expect to fill all 180 spaces in 7-10 days so if you know of anyone who should register, they should be ready on January 12th.

- I encourage you to tell your friends about the January 20th meeting on “Ice Activity/ Immigrant Rights in CCC: What You Need to Know and What You Can Do.” There is so much going on in our country right now, I couldn’t begin..... but I believe that how immigrants - undocumented and documented- and people of color are being treated in the US right now by our own government is the humanitarian issue of our day. Let’s find out what is really happening in our County and is there something we as individuals (or group) can do about it? I hope so and am looking forward to finding out. That doesn’t even get to the attack on women and how quickly we are losing the ground we gained over the last 100 years. This is a crisis as well so I am proud that AAUW and AAUW CA are providing ways for us to respond and try to impact public policy. PUBLIC POLICY

Declassification Of Professional Fields Affects Loan Eligibility

Recent federal actions affecting higher education are slated to directly affect who can afford advanced training. As part of the “One Big Beautiful Bill,” the federal government has adopted a new student-loan framework that relies on a narrow definition of which graduate programs qualify as “professional degrees, dating back to the late 1960’s.” The law takes effect January 1, 2026, with Department of Education implementation expected by June 2026.

Under this change, most graduate students would be limited to \$20,500 per year and \$100,000 total in federal loans, while a smaller group of traditionally designated professions would retain access to much higher borrowing limits.

The programs excluded from the higher loan caps include nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, architecture, accounting, education, and social work—fields that now require advanced degrees and licensure and that remain predominantly female-dominated. The practical effect is that loan-limit changes are likely to fall most heavily on women pursuing essential public-service careers.

Applying outdated classifications to today’s educational landscape ignores how professional training requirements have evolved, risks limiting access to fields already facing workforce shortages and disproportionately harms women, even as broader efforts to weaken the Department of Education—including staffing cuts and the transfer of core responsibilities to other agencies—undermine civil-rights enforcement.

MEMBERS' CORNER



Members' Corner features Bonnie Gallogly this month. A long standing member of OML, she quietly works to serve her community in many ways.

We asked Bonnie to tell us about her younger years.

A. I was born in Long Beach, CA, at the Los Alamitos Naval Hospital where my father was stationed in Communications for the U.S. Air Force during WWII. In 1953, our family was sent to Tachikawa Air Force Base in Japan as part of the occupation forces after the war.

We learned many years later my future husband was also on that base with his family. As an Air Force brat I spent my childhood living in many locations: California, Japan, Biloxi, MS; Long Island, NY; Bedford, MA; and finally San Antonio, TX, where I graduated high school and went on to the University of Texas at Austin. I married in 1971 after my husband returned from a tour in Vietnam. We moved to Riverside, CA; Dover, DE; and then to the East Bay when he left the Air Force. He started working for Flying Tigers Airline and I began teaching middle school in Riverside. I transitioned to teaching high school at Moreau Catholic in Hayward where I spent 35 years teaching Home Economics, while raising our two children.

How did you discover and join AAUW?

A. On my retirement in 2008, my friend Jan Coe led me into AAUW-OML. I was Membership Chair a number of years. I started a Constant Contact news brief before taking on the webmaster, database and master calendar roles. Since I do not have any special tech training or coding talents, it has been a long learning journey to work on our website. It became much easier when we connected with the Association's national website. They provide support when needed.

Tell us about the other things you do to support your community.

A. I have always been committed to supporting women's issues. I participated in fundraising for OML priorities during many years when some of our branch members volunteered selling beer at Niners games at Candlestick Park. I also sell OML directory advertising. I joined the Acalanes chapter of DAR where I am the Veterans Representative overseeing a variety of veteran support programs. "Wreaths Across America" is the largest project that I coordinate for our chapter. Over 6,500 cemeteries nationwide have wreaths placed on veteran graves on the same day in mid December. This is dear to my heart since in my family my father, husband, brother and daughter have all served in the Air Force.

Since 2010, we have been a custodian family of two breeder Labradors for Guide Dogs for the Blind in San Rafael. Our first dog Carmody had three litters of 36 puppies; 18 of those puppies continued into working roles. Our current dog Gladys had her first litter. Those five puppies will return for evaluation and training in January. She will likely have her second litter in spring 2026. Guide Dogs is a wonderful nonprofit that changes lives. We love participating in their mission.


