PUBLIC POLICY

A Simple, New Powerful Way to Take Action—5Calls.org

I recently discovered 5-Calls and was struck by how effective and doable it is. In a moment when news and policy shift daily and it's hard to know where to focus, 5 Calls makes civic action clear, timely, and doable.

The website and app automatically identify your congressional and state representatives based on your ZIP code and provide the phone number for the closest local office, where calls are far more likely to be answered than the congressional or assembly switchboard. For each issue, 5 Calls provides a short, clear conversational script with 5–6 bullet points—you can simply choose the ones that best capture what you want to say.

How it works:

- Enter your ZIP code
- Choose an issue that matters
- Pick your talking points
- Call the local office

I made five calls in under 7 minutes and felt informed, confident, and genuinely empowered. You can also sign up for a weekly email highlighting the most up-to-date issues to weigh in on. Visit <https://5calls.org> or download the “5 Calls” app from the Apple App Store or Google Play (look for five white stars on a blue background).

Prompt 1:

- What the problem is and where you see it in everyday life.
- Why it matters to you personally – a moment or experience that made you care.
- How you imagine science, technology, engineering or math being part of the solution.
- How Tech Trek could help you learn more about the skills or fields connected to solving this problem.

Prompt 2:

Tell the story of your interest in STEM by including:

- A moment, activity, class or person that sparked your curiosity.
- What you discovered, enjoyed or found challenging as you explored STEM.
- How you engage with STEM now – through school, hobbies, clubs, making, building, music/technology, sports science or everyday problem-solving.
- What you hope to learn or do at Tech Trek and how attending camp might support your goals or build your confidence.

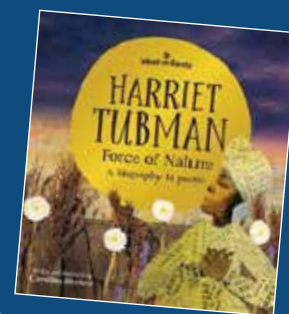

TEEN GIRLS REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AWARENESS PROJECT

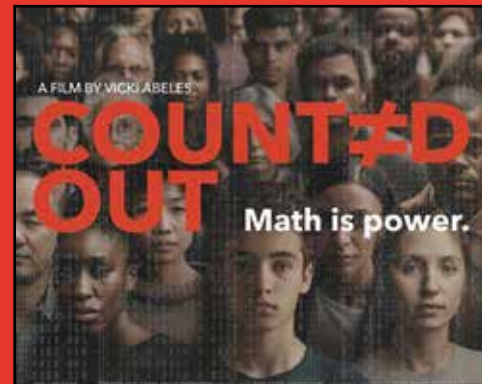
I have been mentoring some local high school girls who are leaders of the H.E.R. project (Health Equity Research). The focus this year is they proposed and drafted a *Teen Girls Reproductive Health Awareness Month* in California and asked our Assemblywoman Rebecca Bauer-Kahan to sponsor a Resolution in the Assembly to declare September 2026 as that month. Bauer-Kahan is the founder and Chair of the Reproductive Health Select Committee. She has agreed to do it as one of two resolutions she can present to the entire Assembly, which will give it prominence and publicity with the full weight of the CA Assembly behind it. After more research and tweaking by the H.E.R. team at the recommendation of RBK, her office will submit it to the CA Legislative Counsel's Office for review.

We asked AAUW CA Public Policy team to support this effort and, after consulting with AAUW CA leadership and our legislative advocate, they are all in. They have established the "Teen Girls Reproductive Health Awareness Project" within the Public Policy Committee. This Resolution will be mentioned in the discussion with all CA Assembly members during Lobby Day. They hired three interns this semester to work on public policy issues and they will use some of the interns' time to work on this project. They will work with the H.E.R. team to do additional research as needed as well as develop a communication plan and materials to distribute to stakeholders in August to ensure the September awareness month impact is significant and effective.

And the even bigger news is that AAUW CA is hoping the focus on reproductive health of teen girls will result in future legislation to enhance existing laws to advance and improve teen girls reproductive health. From teaching about reproductive health in schools, to addressing and controlling misinformation on social media, their interns will work with our local H.E.R. high school girls to provide the information and data needed to demonstrate that more legislation is needed to improve reproductive health outcomes for teen girls in California. Thank you AAUW CA and Assemblywoman Rebecca Bauer-Kahan.

FOLLOW UP ON THE JANUARY DEI MEETING

DEI sponsored a panel on *Immigrant Rights in Contra Costa: What You Need to Know and What You Can Do* for our January 20th member meeting, featuring four local community organizers who provide direct services to the immigrant community. The panel was facilitated by OML member, Ogie Strogatz. The panelists were:

- **Sergio Jaime Lopez**, Contra Costa Immigrant Rights Alliance (CCIRA)
- **Debra Ballinger**, United Latino Voices of CCC
- **Lisa Hoffman**, East Bay Sanctuary Covenant
- **Nancy Dougherty**, Indivisible ReSisters Contra Costa

CCIRA helps immigrants file for asylum with their *Welcome Navigator* program. They connect immigrants with Spanish speaking volunteers who do not give legal advice, but help them complete the application; and “court observers” take notes on what is happening in court. This has great impact by informing immigrants they are not alone and people care about them. **Sergio Lopez** left his country due to political persecution and wanted protection from a country that valued human rights – an experience similar to what asylum seekers experience today.

United Latino Voices of Contra Costa County

This is not a legal organization but does advocacy to get civic engagement, leadership development and power building in the immigrant community so they have a voice. The biggest challenge is lack of legal representation. They also provide community health workers and are involved in tenant rights. They visit immigrant serving businesses to develop a plan if ICE shows up, informing them of their rights. They need more volunteers for immigrant court protection, “Adopt a Corner” program, as well as monetary donations at www.unitedlatinovoices.org.

East Bay Sanctuary Covenant

Provides comprehensive integrative legal services and social services. They serve 12,000 people per year. They work with families who are beyond terrified and grieving, to try to find their members who are in a detention center somewhere. They need volunteers for their Clinic in Richmond on the 3rd Saturday of every month, and for other rapid response activities. To donate: eastbaysanctuary.org

Indivisible ReSisters Contra Costa

They have 400 volunteers and need more to do the following:

- Support the court observation program
- Work at a pantry on Mondays on Clayton Road in Concord with Monument Impact.
- Watch out for ICE at Home Depot, Monument Crisis Center and courts.
- Donations to Monument Impact Food Pantry monumentimpact.org

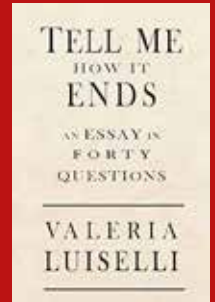

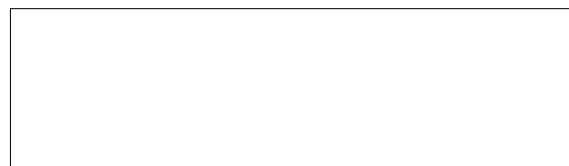
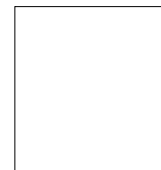
